TURKEY AND BRITAIN TO SIGN PACT

(Special to the Guardian.) CONSTANTINOPLE, June 2.—The Mosul oil agreement between Great Britain and Turkey will be signed on Thursday. It was announced that all questions in the dispute have been settled and that only remains for the Commission of Turkish and British officials to prepare a protocol for the three countries.

Nova Scotia Case To Go Before Royal Commission

(Canadian Press.) HALIFAX, N. S., June 2.—Premier E. N. Rhodes, states today that the case for Nova Scotia which had been in course of preparation since early last fall, will be originally designed for presentation to the federal government, would also be placed before the Royal Commission which, under the chairmanship of Sir Andrew Rae Duncan, would investigate the disabilities of the Maritime Provinces growing out of their position within the confederation.

Amount Spent on Halifax Harbor Improvements

(Canadian Press.) OTTAWA, June 2.—The amount of \$19,048,625.62 has been spent by the Dominion Government since 1911 on harbor improvements and terminals at Halifax. This sum includes expenditures with respect to the Halifax graving dock, sold to the Halifax shipyard, Limited, for \$1,250,000.

Death of Former Town Marshal

(Canadian Press.) FREDERICTON, N. B., June 2.—Alfred J. Barker, who was town marshal of Marysville for many years, but who had been living here with his daughter, Mrs. G. G. RURAL CREDITS BILL IS CLASS LEGISLATION

Declares T. L. Church, Conservative, North West Toronto - Bill Passed After Spirited Debate.

OTTAWA, June 2.—The government's rural credit bill received third reading in the House of Commons Tuesday night. Second reading was given without discussion, but in committee, criticism was general.

While admitting that the scheme required careful administration, Mr. Dunning predicted valuable results in reducing the cost of long term agricultural credits if it was adopted. Some concrete proposals must be made before the provinces could decide whether or not they wished to participate in a federal scheme.

Hon. Charles Dunning moved an amendment to provide that the total expenses of operation should not exceed one per cent of the total amount of the loan. Another amendment which reduces the rate of interest payable for borrowed money to five per cent from eight to seven per cent, was moved by Mr. Dunning, and carried. The bill now goes to the Senate.

LIBERAL PARTY COMPLETELY DISRUPTED

Asquith Puts Ban on Lloyd George in Latest Letter - Welshman Controls Party's Funds.

LONDON, June 1.—The Earl of Oxford and Asquith with a majority of his colleagues including Lord Grey passed what is considered a sentence of excommunication against David Lloyd George from the Liberal party in a new letter to Sir Godfrey Collins, chief Liberal whip, thus making the breach complete so far as the leaders of the party are concerned.

Rhodes, who returned yesterday from a two months visit abroad, stated today that the government hoped to be in a position, in the very near future, to announce the appointment of a new superintendent of education, in succession to Dr. A. H. MacKay.

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, June 2.—Lieut. General Sir William Boog Lishman, director of the Army Medical Service since 1925 and Honorary physician to the King in 1912, is dead at his home here in his 62nd year.

No Vote on Prohibition This Year

(Special to the Guardian.) WASHINGTON, June 2.—Any prospect that existed of Congressional action providing for a national referendum on modification of the Volstead prohibition enforcement act appears to have disappeared with Senator William E. Borah's declaration of opposition to the national referendum movement.

Case of C. N. R. Express Co. Before Court

(Special to the Guardian.) TORONTO, June 2.—Does the C. N. R. Express Company exist as a business operating independently, or is it a subsidiary of the C.N.R.? The question was aroused today in the court of revision.

Canadian Appeals To Come Before Privy Council

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, June 2.—Ten Canadian appeals will come before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council at the next session. The cases include decision on whether profits from "bootlegging" operations are assessable for income tax purposes and on the dispute over engagement of professional hockey players submitted by the Toronto meeting was Y's Man O. R. Gillis.

Death Roll Has Reached 2,800

(Canadian Press.) RANGOON, Burma, June 2.—The death roll of the recent cyclone and tidal wave on the coast of Burma has reached a total of 2,800 according to a report submitted by the commissioner of the district of Arakan. It is feared that the deaths may reach almost 4,000 in the affected regions.

Swedish Cabinet Has Resigned

(Special to the Guardian.) STOCKHOLM, June 2.—The cabinet of E. Tryggve resigned today after an adverse vote in both houses of parliament on the government's unemployment policy.

BAD FIRE IN QUEBEC TOWN

(Canadian Press.) QUEBEC, June 2.—The town of Riviere Du Loup, about 120 miles from this city, was swept by fire this afternoon and fifty-seven buildings were destroyed with an estimated loss of \$1,000,000. The buildings razed included five warehouses, ten stores, forty-two dwellings in the commercial section of the town.

Seiner Orion's Catch Valued At \$26,000

(Canadian Press.) HALIFAX, N. S., June 2.—When the Gloucester Seiner Orion arrived in the local harbour today to await more favorable weather before continuing her mackerel fishing, it was learned that each member of the crew had recently received \$19 as his share of the ship's catch, taken during a cruise of six weeks, the value of the mackerel totalling \$26,000. This placed the Orion far ahead of the rest of the Gloucester fleet.

REV. A. J. MCGILLIVRAY ELECTED MODERATOR OF PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA

(Canadian Press.) MONTREAL, June 2.—Rev. A. J. McGillivray of Knox Church, Guelph, Ont., was elected moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada at the first session of the General Assembly held in Knox Crescent Church here. Only two men were voted on, the other being Rev. E. S. Banks-Nelson, of Knox Church, Hamilton, Ont. Following the first vote the election was made unanimous.

CHINA READY TO MAKE WAR ON BRITAIN

Is Statement of Mr. Chu, Chinese Minister to Italy - Violent Altercation With Sir Malcolm Delevigne.

(Canadian Press.) GENEVA, June 2.—China is sick to death over foreign interference in her domestic affairs. Mr. Chu, the Chinese Minister to Italy, made this declaration yesterday during a tempestuous session of the permanent opium commission in a violent altercation with the British delegate Sir Malcolm Delevigne. Sir Malcolm had criticised the importation of morphine into China. Mr. Chu became so excited that he literally screamed. He talked of the readiness of the Chinese to make war on Great Britain. "If you can find a Chinese who is not anti-foreign and not anti-British I'll say he is not a good Chinese" exclaimed the Minister. The word battle became so heated that M. Bourgeois, President of the commission, was obliged to adjourn the session.

Supreme Court Discusses Anti-Evolution Law

(Canadian Press.) NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 2.—The anti-evolution law of Tennessee set today is before the Supreme Court of the state for decision. Attacked on the one side as "an absurd law, entirely out of harmony with American institutions" and defended on the other as the "thoughtful enactment of a sovereign people to protect their children in their belief in the divine origin of man," the statute was discussed in arguments before the court Monday and Tuesday. The case came before the Supreme Court just as an appeal in behalf of John Thomas Scopes, who was fined \$100 at Dayton for teaching the theory of evolution. An opinion is not expected until the fall term, as the court adjourns in a few days.
