MONTREAL school teachers are also agitating for an increase in salaries, fixing the minimum at \$400 a year.

THE Guardian regrets to learn of the very serious illness of Peter Proud, one of the oldest and most respected residents of York.

Prosecutor Jenkins has laid information against Patrick Doherty and Mary Jane McMillan. The summonses are returnable Friday. Prosecutor Campbell has a case against Angus Des Roches returnable next Tuesday.

The funeral service of the late Hector McArthur, a native of Charlottetown, P. E. I., whose death occurred at the Old Town, Me., City hospital, were held Wednesday afternoon at the undertaking parlors of J. L. S. Hincks. Interment was made at Forest Hill, Old Town.

DAVIS & FRASER, in a circular addressed to farmers regarding their supply of hogs, add a note on the profits of this industry. They cite the case of a particular farmer, Robert Benjamin, living in Brookfield, Hants Co., N. S. who raised and marketed 100 hogs. At six months old they averaged 150 lbs. dressed. It cost him \$500 for the feed and \$70 for the feed of the sows to produce the pigs, or a total of \$570. He sold 15,000 lbs. pork at 8c., \$1,200, giving him a net profit of \$630. Besides this he had the manure, which enabled him to get from the same piece of land the following year thirty tons more hay than on the previous one.

OBITUARY.—The death of Robert Burns McPhee (a native of Riverdale near Bonshaw, Queen's Co.) took place at Murray River on Wednesday March 25th, 1903 of cancer of the stomach and bowels, complicated with a very severe attack of the grippe, in the 40th year of his age—A good, honest, principled, God fearing man, who well represented many of the noble characteristics so strongly advocated by his namesake, that distinguished Scottish poet Burns, and it was such characters as the deceased whom Burns had in view in one of his leading poems when he used such expressions as "The honest man though e'er so poor, is king of men for a that." and in the same poem refers to the dignities possible for a king to confer upon certain parties and in contrast says: "The pith of sense and pride of worth, are higher ranks than a that." To the deceased might well be applied the following: "An honest man's the noblest work of God; having died as he lived trusting in the merits of a crucified Redeemer. On Friday March 27th the Rev. Mr. Carter conducted the funeral service before a large concourse of people, after which the remains were followed by relatives and friends to their last resting place in the new burying ground in Murray River. The deceased leaves a sorrowing wife and five small children to mourn the loss of a kind husband and loving father.

EASTERN NOTES.—Spring is here comparatively early after four months of the severest kind of winter weather. The ice is gone, navigation is open and our fishermen are preparing for their season's work. The roads are nearly impassable and travellers few.—The milk haulers for the Red Point cheese factory for the coming season are Charles Young, eastern route; Alex. H. He now has under consideration an offer of remunerative employment for the summer from a well known mercantile firm.—Washington Young had one of his fingers shattered by the bursting of his gun a few days ago, the third accident of a similar nature that has happened here in a few years, a warning to boys, big and small, with overloaded guns.—The genial and well-preserved face of David Walker, bookseller, is in evidence amongst us once more. To the courtesy of William Young he owes transportation from Souris to the hospitable roof of F. S. Robertson.—It becomes our sad duty to chronicle the sudden death from paralysis on the 11th inst., of Flora Gordon, wife of Alex. Scott. A native of Ulster, in this Island, for more than twenty years she filled the duties of wife, mother, neighbor and host in a manner that left nothing to be desired. Her hospitality was unbounded, unostentatious at the bedside of the sick and the suffering, a constant and attentive and welcome visitor; in the church an untiring worker, and in the social circle an agreeable companion. She leaves to lament her demise a mourning husband, two daughters, Bessie and Maggie, who lose a kind mother's love and devotion, her aged and venerable father-in-law Deacon Scott, who will miss her kind attentions, and one brother, Rev. John A. Gordon, M. A., Pastor of the First Baptist Church, Montreal.

HIS NEW AIRSHIP PARIS, April 10.—M. Santos-Dumont is busy with his airship at his headquarters in Neuilly, on the bank of the Seine. He is now completing his No. 7. It is about forty-nine feet long and of 800 cubic metres capacity. Its front end is slightly larger than the rear, and the airship is provided with a compensating 'balloon' filled with air. The motor is of three horse power.
