A PORK PACKING PROPOSITION.

Messrs. Davies and Fraser, Halifax, N. S., have submitted a proposition to the Island Government through Hon. B. Rogers, to equip a pork packing, canning and cold storage business here on condition that they can secure 30,000 hogs and 1,600 head of beef cattle per year. They do not specify any quantity of fruit etc., but will handle what offers of marketable quality. They ask for no concessions except exemption from taxation for 25 years and that the Government secure cold storage on the Island steamers to Pictou. This proposition is a business one which contrasts favorably with that recently published. They will employ what labor is necessary as well as expend money to build a plant suited to the requirements of the business and as they are already in this business and have made a success of it they can no doubt successfully handle it. Messrs. Davies and Fraser are not strangers to our people. They have bought during past years large quantities of hogs here, paying a regular price and taking no advantage when buyers were scarce. They want the farmers to write them stating the quantity of hogs and cattle they can supply per month and it is certainly in the interest of every farmer to give them this information. They should do so at once.
