OTTAWA, July 12—(CP)—Mobilization of Canadian manpower for military purposes in the next few months will be carried out in a manner which will interfere as little as possible with the civilian occupations of men called up for training. Thus, it is expected, that in centres where considerable numbers of men work on night shifts the night workers will be organized into companies which will drill during the day whereas the majority of men called up will drill two or more evenings a week. 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CROP REPORT

GENERAL
Crop conditions in most parts of Manitoba and Alberta are satisfactory at present, but in Saskatchewan many districts require good rains to prevent further deterioration. Heading of wheat is general throughout the Prairie Provinces and the growth of coarse grains is mainly favourable. Some light damage from hail has occurred in scattered localities. Grasshoppers have caused serious damage in southeastern Alberta and southwestern Saskatchewan. Pastures are in good condition in most districts.
In the Province of Quebec crops made only slow progress as a result of continuation of unseasonably low temperatures and excessive rains; warm, dry weather would rapidly improve the outlook. In Ontario satisfactory weather conditions have prevailed during the past week and the general outlook is now good. In the Maritime Provinces the past week has seen a continuation of unfavourable weather conditions and the season generally continues backward. In British Columbia hot, dry weather continues and, although in general crop conditions at present are satisfactory, rain is urgently needed to prevent early deterioration.
PRAIRIE PROVINCES
ALBERTA—Well distributed rains in central and southern areas have checked deterioration, and crop conditions throughout the province remain generally satisfactory. What is mostly in shot blade and in some districts has commenced to head out. Hail losses are slight. Coarse grains continue to make good progress. The sugar beet crop is in favourable condition and forage crops are good. SASKATCHEWAN—Moderately heavy rains have fallen in the northeastern section of the province, but in many other districts, particularly in the central and southern areas, crops are required. Heading out of the wheat is well advanced and crops in the northeastern, west central and southwestern sections are progressing satisfactorily. Crops in the extreme southwest have been badly damaged by grasshoppers. In other areas some deterioration, especially in stubble crops, is apparent due to heat and lack of moisture. MANITOBA—Light to moderate rains have been general throughout the province. Wheat is mostly of good, even growth and heading out. Coarse grains are developing well. A few points of experienced hail, but the damage appears to have been light. Sugar beet crops are progressing favourably and pastures are in good condition.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

EASTERN TOWNSHIPS AND OTTAWA VALLEY—Heading and oats are backward. Hail damage commenced in many sections; while the cut is expected to be up to average in quantity, important rain districts. Pastures are in good condition. Peas, tomatoes and other canning crops are backward. Potatoes and other roots are progressing slowly. Tobacco planting, which was about a week later than in an average year, has been completed. The strawberry crop is only fair. Other small fruits give promise of a good yield. LOWER ST. LAWRENCE AND LAKE ST. JOHN DISTRICT—Grain crops have benefited by higher temperatures of the past few days and are now making a satisfactory progress, but the growth generally is backward. An average hail crop is indicated. Pastures are in good condition.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

Having operations are in full swing and a heavy crop is being swung; the quality in some districts has suffered from excessive moisture. Fall wheat is filling well and a good yield seems assured. Spring grain crops are in good condition. Hail damage to root crops, corn and tomatoes are backward, but growth has been stimulated by the recent warm weather. Pasture is ample and in excellent condition. Strawberries have been plentiful and a normal yield of raspberries is anticipated. An average apple crop is in prospect; other tree fruits, generally show promise, but it is expected that peach and grape crops will be below average. Tobacco has been retarded by unfavourable growing conditions and continued warm weather is needed.

MARITIME PROVINCES

In Nova Scotia and New Brunswick grain has made slow progress. In the Saint John River Valley potato crops on 200-300 lands are reported to have suffered some damage from excessive moisture. The hay crop promises well and pastures are for the most part in very good condition. Apple, pear and cherry crops are in good condition. A heavy hay crop is indicated and roots are making excellent progress. Pastures are exceptionally good.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

Grain crops will be light. The first cutting of alfalfa was heavy and of good quality. Root crops under irrigation are doing well but crops on dry land require rain. Tomatoes and potatoes indicate good average yields. Semi-ripe tomatoes are moving to market. Berry crops generally are below average in yield, due to lack of moisture. Cherries are yielding well in the interior and are of excellent quality, but in a light crop in the lower Fraser Valley. All tree fruits are sizing well and indicate good average yields. Orchard pests are under control. Some districts report a shortage of water for irrigation purposes. Pasture is fair to good, but would benefit with rain.
