Literature And Life

By BOOKMAN

"Broken Earthenware" is the title of a book that appeared years ago. It had a sub-title "Twice-born Men" and was written by Harold Begbie. He cited cases where wonderful changes were wrought in men - drunkards were reclaimed and made sober; people with vicious habits were reformed. It was a powerful apologetic for the beliefs that man may be changed, a belief held by the Christian church, that a man may have a new chance in life.

These cases he cited and attested their trustworthiness, illustrated the teaching of Jeremiah where he takes us to the Potters house and shows us a work upon wheels. The vessel is marred but that does not prevent the workman from making a vessel second best to the one he tried to make for a first place.

This work of his is great and wonderful. His very face with change of heart is changed. The world will not believe a man repents. And this wise world of ours is mainly right. Full seldom doth a man repent . . . And plant himself afresh."

But change does happen. It happens in the intellectual world. A. C. McGreggor in his essays tells how one day in school the teacher opened up the old Latin world so that it was alive. It was like a new birth. Vergil was a new author to him after that.

In Dalhousie University many years ago there was a student who loved literature and sometimes studied at home. He had a room where he read poetry, and there are, quite a number of men in Canada and the United States who affirm that any time they have for fine literature they owe, not to the English professor of that time, as much as to this student, who showed them how to appreciate Arnold and Browning and Wordsworth. It was their re-birth.

Recently I visited a jail in one of our Maritime cities and talked to the inmates a few minutes. When asked to suggest a hymn to sing, one lad said let us sing, "Where is my Wandering Boy to-night?" What prompted that request was "he had come home in thought? Did he think that perhaps a mother - his own - might be asking that question that very night? Was he back home in thought? Did he think that perhaps he liked the tune, and wished to sing it again?"

The request was a psychological one. We should never give up hope. Browning has a little poem, "Apparent Failure," where he tells us that he visited the morgue what he called the "Dead House" in Paris and saw a sign that set his mind working - three suicides; they were perhaps victims of Pride, Covetousness and Lust. He asks is that the end? He muses and says this: "My own hope is a sun will pierce The thickest cloud earth ever stretched;

That, after last, returns the first, Though a wide compass round be fetched; That what began best can't end worst. Nor God blessed once, prove accursed."

What tragic losses there are! Have we lost the love of urgency? There is a great deal of "Broken Earthenware" tossed out in the dump heap of the world. General William Booth, a couple of generations ago tried to awaken the world in the urgency of this need. We see it in our jails, we read of it in the daily Press where we have an account of juvenile crime. The other day I saw a half dozen young fellows going into answer for their misdeeds; saw young girls in prison - that should, if they had behaved, been out in the sunshine and free air of heaven. Had some one, sometime, somewhere, had blended in their upbringing, "Broken Earthenware?"

But as the old hymn has it, "While the lamp holds on to burn, The greatest sinner may return." Begbie, if my memory serves me right, has one character, "Old Born Drunk" who was reformed. A case where "the exception proves the rule."

born in Sherbrooke, Quebec, in 1905, of Scottish parentage, both his father and mother being natives of Dumfries. His early education was in the Presbyterian College, Montreal, from which institution he holds the Bachelor's degree in Divinity.

His first congregation was St. James', Truro, where he was Minister from 1929 to 1936 when he was called to succeed Dr. James Potter in MacVicar Memorial Church, Outremont, Montreal, Mr. Bell was twice elected Moderator of the Presbytery of Montreal, and in 1947 was chosen Moderator of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa. In June last he was elected to the highest office in the gift of the church, the Moderatorship of the General Assembly, being the youngest Minister in the history of the Canadian Church so to be honoured. In addition to his pastorate he is sessional pastor of Practical Theology at the Presbyterian College, Montreal, and serves in the Presidency of the Canadian Christian Endeavour Union and the Montreal Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

During the past summer the Moderator represented the Presbyterian Church in Canada at the Pan-Canadian Alliance in Geneva, Switzerland, and at the first assembly of the World Council of Churches in Amsterdam, Holland, following which he occupied the pulpit as guest preacher in Glasgow, Glasgow, Belfast and other cities in the United Kingdom. low back pain, yet where there was no ruptured disk and no other back disturbance were present, everything was found to be normal except that the sedimentation rate was too rapid. It was from three to four times as rapid as that of a normal individual.

As there were no conditions present to account for his back pain, no treatment was given but the patient was kept under observation. Finally certain symptoms appeared. Further examination showed that he was suffering from multiple myeloma, a malignant tumor of the bone marrow, beginning in many places in the body.

Had this patient called on his family physician who could find no cause for the low back pain, perhaps he would have been given sedative or had his back strapped. This case shows the value of routine examinations which perhaps, as patients, we may consider unnecessary or "far-fetched" in establishing a diagnosis.
