**Miss O. Douglas Is Badly Injured**

The following clipping is from a Saskatchewan newspaper and Miss Douglas referred to is the youngest daughter of the late Dr. Douglas, M. L. A., of Hunter River. The accident occurred on December 5th. Miss Douglas has been living in Prince Albert for some years with her mother. One sister Mrs. Roy Dunn resides in Winnipeg and another Mrs. Rae Merriwell resides in Saskatchewan.

Miss Olive Douglas was seriously injured last evening when she accidentally fell through the skylight of the auditorium at the Collegiate Institute, a distance of ten feet, striking her back on the gallery steps when she fell. Miss Douglas is a teacher at the King George School and had been at the educational banquet. Shortly before 8 o'clock she withdrew. Going upstairs to get her wraps she decided to go through a window and would not disturb the speakers at the banquet. The snow had concealed where the skylight was and Miss Douglas walked unsuspectingly upon the glass. She was rendered unconscious by the fall but regained her senses just before the ambulance arrived.

**Causes Excitement**

The incident created considerable excitement at the banquet and tended to put a damper upon the enthusiasm, a number of guests being so affected by the accident that they had to leave.

Chas. McDonald, M.L.A., had just commenced to speak in the hall adjoining the auditorium when the crash of glass was heard. When guests rushed into the auditorium they found Miss Douglas lying unconscious on the gallery steps of the auditorium. Dr. Tyerman administered first aid and the ambulance was called and Miss Douglas was removed to the home of Mayor McLeod, her uncle, where Dr. F. W. Fourney took charge.

More complete examination today indicates that Miss Douglas is most seriously injured and it is believed that there is pressure on the spinal cord and the patient is paralysed in the lower limbs. The pain is intense and it is necessary to keep Miss Douglas under the influence of opiates. She was taken to Winnipeg on this afternoon's train as it will be necessary to have a specialist on spinal injuries examine her. In any event the injury is exceedingly grave, there being possibly a fracture of the backbone.
