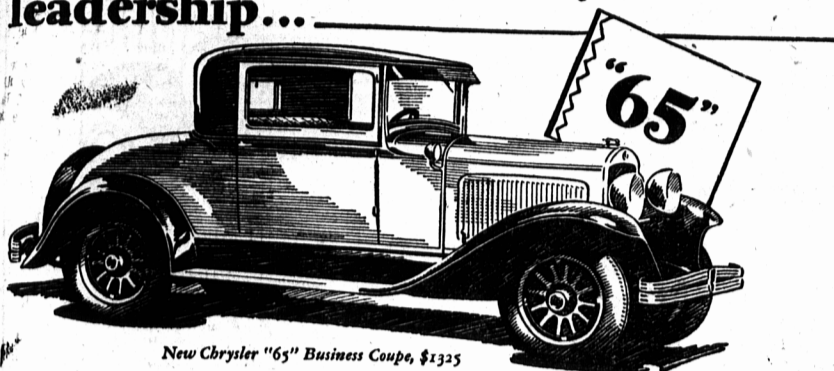

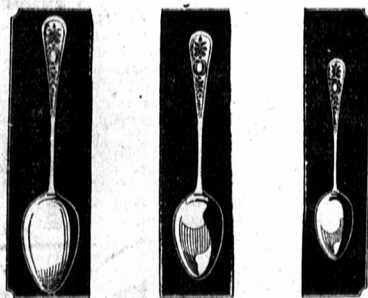

It is too early to know what result will be achieved but the experiment looks promising. It is the intention of the Fishery Department to keep the boat in operation until the end of December.

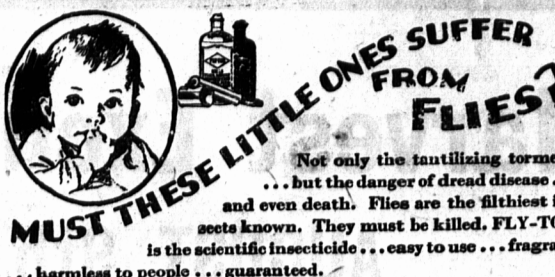

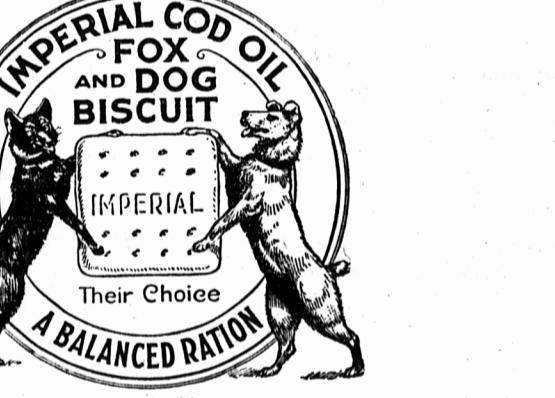
