(Continued from page three.) 8.20 o'clock. THE PREMIER moved the House into committee on the bill to authorise the revision of the Statutes. He explained the provisions of the bill. The Provincial Legislature had been in existence since 1773, and there had not been a proper revision of the statutes in 139 years. Some twenty years ago a revision was begun, but was left unfinished. There is no parallel for these conditions in any Province of Canada. No one except a lawyer could know what the law is on any given subject, and lawyers found it extremely difficult. The revision was a matter of absolute necessity. Some good work was done by the Commission of twenty years ago, and would aid in the present task. MR. RICHARDS said he understood the revision made twenty years ago was rejected because it was practically useless, although it cost a great sum. He quoted Hon. Fred. Peters as authority for his statement. He would like to learn what the revision is likely to cost. THE PREMIER thought the last speaker was talking from hearsay. The former revision may have cost too much, but it was valuable and was to be found in every law office in the Province. In other Provinces the laws are revised once in

years, and the work was comparatively light, but here the laws from the beginning must be gone over. The laws should be in such shape that the average citizen would know the law in matters concerning him. MR. RICHARDS said that Mr. Peters had made the statement that the revision cost \$10,000 with four to five thousand more for extras. THE PREMIER said the work had been well done as far as it went, but was largely lost because the Peters Government refused its sanction. What Mr. Peters said in a political effort to discredit an opponent was not to be relied on. HON. MR. ARSENAULT praised the work of the revisors of twenty years ago. All the lawyers wanted the work, which could not be bought now being out of print. The Premier said \$1500 was not voted for the work, it might cost more. The Government would be responsible that it should be well done and at reasonable cost. He explained that there were two plans, one was to have the laws revised and printed, then submitted to the House and passed. This involved enormous cost for twice printing. The other plan, adopted in Ontario, was to have the revision submitted to the Governor in Council before printing, and to be put in force, by proclamation. He favored the Ontario plan which would have the advantage of a double supervision and economy of cost. HON. MR. STEWART favored submitting the revision to a special committee of the Legislature before it shall have effect as law. 3 evening take 2. The bill was agreed to and reported without amendment. The St. Andrews Presbyterian Church incorporation amendment was agreed to in committee of the whole. Mr. Duntan in the chair. The Schools bill was agreed to in committee. Mr. T. W. McDonald in the chair. The bill gives power to the Government to increase the number of inspectors to six, if necessary. Provides a clerk to the Superintendent at a salary not over \$1000, and allows the Superintendent actual traveling expenses not to exceed \$400. It makes non-residents owning property in a district liable to assessment for ordinary school expenses. There was some brief discussion on several changes in which Messrs Arsenault, Simpson, and Martin took part.

MR. MYERS discussed the question of school holidays. He favored five weeks in midsummer, two weeks in October, and one week vacation between Christmas and New Years. The boys must be at home in October. MR. DEWAR favored vacations on the lines set out by Mr. Myers. As to consolidation he did not think it would work well. It broke down at HInshoro. HON. MR. DALTON thought trustees should be chosen yearly and at least two of them parents who are sending children to the school. MR. RICHARDS had heard complaints that holidays were too long in summer, when small children could best attend school. In the stormy winter weather these could not attend. He favored consolidation and military drill. The discussion was continued by Hon. Mr. Stewart, Mr. Myers, and others. Hon. Mr. Arsenault, thought that the matter of holidays might be left to the Board of Education. Mr. McWilliams preferred to leave it to the trustees to suit the needs of each district. Mr. Dohie favored a vacation in summer and two in autumn or winter. Hon. Mr. McKinnon thought the matter should be left over. THE PREMIER said the changes being made were really to increase the teachers' pay. Other changes:

would be made in future. The bill was agreed to with amendments. HON. MR. STEWART introduced the bill to incorporate the Imperial Motor Company, omitting the clause as to exercising cars on the streets. At 11 o'clock the House adjourned till 4 o'clock tomorrow. The House opened to the public at Thursday, May 2, 1912. 11.40 o'clock. The sitting was largely devoted to third readings and passing bills that had not yet reached their final stage. These included the bill to incorporate the Enterprise Trading Company, the Income Tax bill, the Oyster Fisheries bill, the R. C. Bishop bill, the Island Guardian Publishing Company bill, the Imperial Motor Car Company bill, the Summerside Incorporation bill, the Appropriation bill, the Dominion Fox Breeding Company bill, the bill to tax agents soliciting liquor orders and the garnishing of debt's bill. THE PREMIER as chairman of committee reported the draft address to his Honor the Lieutenant Governor, which was adopted. Hon. Mr. Dalton, Hon. Mr. McNeill and Mr. Dohie were named a committee to present the same. The House in committee then took up the arrangement of the pauper scale. This concluded the business preparatory to prorogation. The House took recess. The formal prorogation of the P.E. I. Legislature took place yesterday at 2 o'clock, with the usual military display. The Guard of Honor, under command of Capt. McKay, presented a splendid appearance and marched well. His Honour, having entered and taken his seat, issued the following acts, fifty four in all.
