HONS. Premier Peters and J. H. Cumiskey, C. P. Dr. Chase's Ointment

An attempt was made on Monday to launch the vessel that went ashore last fall at East Point near the farm of Laughlin McDonald and which was subsequently purchased by Capt Thomas Kichham and placed in first class repair. The effort was almost successful but in the evening a violent storm came on and these on board were compelled to scuttle her to prevent her being dashed to pieces. Yesterday about eight o'clock in a heavy ortherly gale the schooner Laurel owned by William Moffatt of Mayfield, commanded by Captain Dupucette, and carrying 104 tons of coal from Sydney to Rustico, was driven ashore at Blooming Point, about a mile west of Clark's factory between Traocadie and Savage Harbor after a wild night exposed to the storm. The schooner lies in about six feet of water, and is a total wreck, the spars being also bent and the sails torn to ribbons, but the captain and crew of three men reached shore in safety at noon yesterday.

The home of Charles E. Pratt, Bayfield Street will witness a pretty marriage this morning when his eldest daughter Miss Belle will be united in matrimony to Jeremiah S. Clark, B. A., son of John C. Clark, Esq., of Bay View. The ceremony will be performed by Rev. G. R. White, M. A. pastor of the Prince Street Baptist Church assisted by Rev. J. A. Gordon, M. A. of Montreal. The nuptial knot will be tied under an arch of ivy in which will be suspended a bell of flowers while the wedding march will be played by Professor W. H. Watts. The bride will wear a costume of blue gray ladies' cloth with cream silk applique trimmings and hat to match and will carry a handsome bouquet of pink carnations. The bridesmaid, Miss Mani Pratt will be dressed in white Swiss muslin and will carry a bouquet of white carnations. The groom will be supported by a fellow college student, W. Everett McNeill, B. A. of Harvard. These presents will include only the immediate relatives of the bride and groom. The presents testify to the universal esteem in which the happy couple are held and include a cheque from the bride's father, and a case of silverware from the Sunday School teachers of the Baptist Church. Mr. and Mrs. Clark leave by the morning express for Ottawa en route to Winnipeg and the Northwest where Mr. Clark will enter upon work among the Indians under the supervision of the Indian Department at Ottawa. Mr. Clark is well known in the provinces as one of the leading lights in the literary sphere. He is the editor of poems of the late Dr. Silas L. Rand and has recently completed after three years' labor a dictionary of the Micmac language begun by Dr. Rand.
