TIMELY NOTES ON TOPICS CONNECTED WITH Silver Fox Farming

The annual meeting of the Charlottetown Silver Fox Company Limited, was held on Wednesday evening, June 8, at the Hotel de Ville. It was the twenty-fifth annual meeting since it was organized. Two of the original members are still at the head of affairs—Lt. Colonel H. M. Davison, V. D., and Ernest Coffin. It has been well managed and the fact that it has survived through all the storms and stresses of a quarter of a century and is still going strong is a tribute to the officers and directors. Just off-hand I can name one other company that was organized about the same time and is still in existence—the Imperial Silver Black Fox Company of Montague.

The Island Furriers, whose place of business is in the Canadian Bank of Commerce building, have a nice line of silver fox pelts ready to be converted into scarfs. Last season they handled quite a number, mostly to the tourist trade, and this year have purchased more largely in expectation of increasing sales. The writer had the privilege of examining quite a few of their skins and congratulated the manager on the judgment he showed in the selection as they were mostly of good color with some quite good specimens.

There is a market right in Prince Edward Island for at least a thousand skins annually if it is properly exploited. It should be ready each and every one of us who are connected with fox farming to cultivate the ground here so as to absorb as many pelts as possible. After all, why should the pelts of Prince Edward Island wear nice furs? They measure up in every respect to those of the ladies in any other country. It seems to be the fact that the silver fox is indigenous to this country that has prevented its being worn more locally.

Broadening out a little further we have the Maritime Provinces as a field for exploitation. There are plenty of people in Nova Scotia who can buy silver fox. The same applies to New Brunswick although many thousands of them in fact are not in quite the same measure. The further afield there is, the more the Ontario and British Columbia, with the Prairie Provinces capable of taking care of the pelts produced there. Yes, my friends, there is plenty of opportunities in Canada for the sale of silver fox pelts. It is a virgin field and we should plan in collaboration or otherwise, our Western friends to make our ladies style conscious as regards our product. The way to do it is by advertising through fashion magazines and newspapers. Some \$10,000 judiciously spent would have a very appreciable effect.

Some ranchers in the vicinity of Charlottetown have lost some pups lately and on opening them up they found the liver congested and a condition resembling jaundice. On looking into the matter I have arrived at the conclusion that the cause is a too heavy diet of meat. Questioned closely three ranchers admitted they had been feeding very heavily with meat as the foxes seemed ravenous for food. A change to part fish and an increase in cereals rather than meat has been helpful in other cases pups have been lost due to worms which have become so numerous that they punctured the bowels in a great many places.

Clean up, clean up! Clean up and disinfect should be the program on every fox ranch on Prince Edward Island. The prevalence of a disease resembling distemper among dogs and cats makes this procedure imperative. There is nothing that will prove as good insurance against trouble as cleanliness and the use of a good strong coal tar disinfectant. The cost is trifling. Those who have not cleaned out their breeding boxes should lose no time as hot weather may be here very shortly and then fleas will breed with greatest rapidity.

It is also the correct procedure to use disinfectant in washing out the sheds where the pups are kept. It will keep everything clean and sweet and prevent fleas, keep down lungworm and hookworm and contribute to the general health of the animals.

Feeding fish. The season the past week has been favorable for the fishermen and very little difficulty has been experienced in securing quantities of codfish and some hake. Codfish or hake is an excellent fox food but when used to replace meat twice as much fish in poundage is required. Theoretically, according to tables, it is claimed that the protein content of fish is very little lower than that of meat, but results do not work out in this way. There is no question that fish contains a greater amount of water than meat and for nutritional purpose it is a safe bet to use meat in the proportion of twice as much.

Dr. Wylie Allen fed fish in the proportion of half fish and half meat last season. A check-up on results showed that his foxes were very much later furring in, but they did fur in a splendid way and their color was excellent in December—which is the time when it is wanted that way. This year he is increasing the fish content of his feed mixture. By the way, Dr. Wylie showed up a marvelous full silver female at the fox demonstration held by Fieldman Fred Burke in Charlottetown the early

British scientists have evolved a new breed of rabbit that has a coat of fur resembling that of a silver fox. The rabbit breeding had quite a vogue in Great Britain some years ago and large rabbitries were established that specialized in the breeding of chinchilla rabbits. Pelts seemed to present a return on the capital invested, but due to the shedding quality of rabbit fur the demand petered out.

Goat breeders are advertising in fur magazines advising for ranchers to buy a few goats as a source of milk. Records, they state, show that while the cow has produced more than 25 times her own weight in milk at a cost of more than four cents per quart, the goat has produced more than thirty times her own weight in milk at a cost of two cents per quart. They claim it is a paying sideline for fur breeders. A breeder of milk who keeps a goat dairy says: "It is the general belief that goat milk is alkaline in reaction, and because we feed so much acid to our milk in the form of meat and cereals it is of much importance that they be supplied with a more alkaline feeding counteract the acid. We feed goat milk the breeder is able to guard against a very acid condition and to supply a certain amount of minerals which would not be had from cow's milk."

Chili, which shares with Bolivia and Peru the distinction of being the only known source of the now nearly extinct chinchilla, has ceased to be a contributor to the world's fur markets except for grey fox, silver fox and seal-skins. The depletion of fur resources is hoped to be made up by fur farming company with a capitalization of \$200,000 in new breeding silver foxes, blue foxes, ermine foxes and a few other varieties of fur bearing animals. They hope to produce 1,200 skins to market this year with an approximate value of \$80,000. The cost of feed, water, horse meat, eggs and marine birds and seaweed.

George A. Callback, Manager of the Fur Marketing Department of the Canadian National Fox Breeders' Association will be speaking at next Thursday evening meeting of the Charlottetown Fox Club. All fox ranchers or others connected with the industry are invited to be present at the Agricultural Hall at eight p. m.

A meeting of the Directors of the Prince Edward Island Silver Fox Breeders' and Exhibitors' Association was held on Wednesday evening, June 8, at the City Hall, City Building, Charlottetown. All members of the Association should keep this date in mind and endeavor to be present as masters of considerable interest to all will come before the meeting.

We note that at a recent fox club meeting the question of the saving made by using fish instead of meat was part of the discussion of the evening. Relative food values are believed to be much in favor of meat. Some say to get equal results twice as much fish must be fed; some say meat costs six cents a pound and fish only two cents a pound, the saving by the use of fish would be about 33 1-3 per cent. This would figure out over a four month period to about five per cent per pup, allowing that it costs a dollar per month on the average to feed a pup during the months of May, June, July and August. In a large ranch this would mean a very considerable saving. Then again the use of fish probably increases the bone structure, and consequently the size of the fox and probably also its prolificness because of the phosphorous content of fish.

Phosphorous is a very necessary constituent of animal and vegetable life and many of our readers may have noted that the President of the United States has called attention to the necessity of increasing phosphate deposits of the United States because of their future value both to the people, the soil and the animal kingdom. The fact that so many Maritimers have become law-makers, legislators, judges, professors and doctors has been ascribed to our fish diet, but of course credit must be also given to heredity and the part played by the good old stock from England, Scotland, Ireland and France which came to our shores.

The writer of this column felt complimented some time ago by an invitation to address the fur farmers of the United States at their summer school to be held in Milwaukee this month. It would have been a very great pleasure indeed to have made the trip and met so many fine gentlemen connected with our industry, but circumstances were such that I could not accept.
