LONDON, Sept. 29.—Britain demands that Turks evacuate neutral zone immediately. ## Another Excellent Show At the Prince Edward

## Died From Heart Failure Returning From Exhibition

### Body of Mr. Daniel Wright of Cherry Valley Found on Roadside Near Alexandra Inquest Held Yesterday.

"Death due to heart failure" was the verdict given yesterday afternoon by the jury empaneled by Coroner James Moore upon the remains of Mr. Daniel Wright of Cherry Valley, who was discovered about midnight Thursday night lying dead or at least totally unconscious upon the roadside in the vicinity of Alexandra. The body of the deceased, who was about 65 years of age, a resident of Cherry Valley, was found by Messrs. J.J. McInnis, Arthur Irving and Dennis Carey. They were driving home to Vernon Thursday evening from attending the Exhibition, about sundown. Mr. Wright who was also returning from the city passed them on the road in his carriage and when they reached Brehaut's Bridge they saw him lying in the middle of the road, the horse grazing nearby. The bridge is a dangerous place at night and it is supposed that Mr. Wright had got out of the carriage in order to cross more surely. No marks or bruises of any kind were noticeable on the body, as would almost certainly have been the case had he been upset while in the carriage with deep regret. After conveying him to his home in their own carriage the discoverers of the body immediately notified Dr. Keeping of Vernon who upon his arrival found life extinct and reported the case to the Attorney General. Coroner Moore was authorized to hold an inquest which he did at 2 p.m. yesterday with the result given above. The unexpected fatality had saddened the community of Cherry Valley, for though the deceased lived alone and left no immediate family he had a large circle of friends and acquaintances and the news of his sudden death will be received by them with deep regret. ## 144 Killed By Explosion Near San Torenzo

(Special to The Guardian.)  
GENOVA, Sept. 29.—An explosion caused by lightning today, destroyed the Falconara, Port, near San Torenzo, on the Gulf of Genoa, and wrecked the town, killing and wounding many persons. The wounded are being taken to the hospital in Spezia, nearby. Apparently many sailors are among the victims.

The entire naval garrison at Falconara Port is believed to have been killed in an explosion caused by lightning which destroyed everything within a radius of ten miles. There are many hundreds of wounded. SPEZIA, Sept. 29.—The number of dead is feared to reach 144 in the explosion today at Falconara Port, near here, according to available lists. Several hundred have been seriously injured. A majority of the victims are still beneath the wreckage. SPEZIA, Sept. 29.—The wounded are being rushed to the hospitals here, all of which are already filled. Military forces have been assigned to the work of rescue. The explosion occurred in a violent storm which damaged the crops and property of the inhabitants for large areas along the gulf. Half crazed with terror from fire and storm, the despairing population is being relieved through government care. San Torenzo is located on the shore of the Gulf of Spezia and is an inland town about two miles from San Torenzo. The whole of the coastline in this section.
