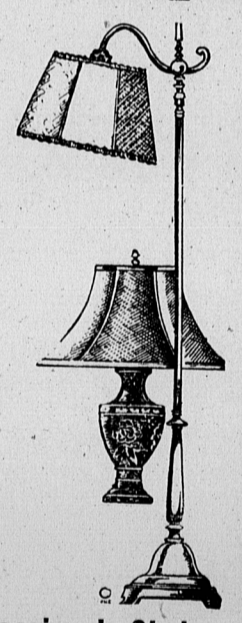

Lakota Club Salt Pork
 Buy one pound fat salt pork cut into thin slices and freshen in hot water five to eight minutes. Drain thoroughly and wipe dry. Dip in beaten egg, then in finely rolled cracker crumbs. Fry until crisp in deep fat. Serve with hot cream sauce, stuffed baked potatoes, and buttered cauliflower in green pepper cases.

Maybe you can imagine how good that above meal is from just reading about it—but take a tip from me, make it once—it is a revelation to an ambitious cook.

Headcheese For Profit
 Blanch whole pig's head without the brain with pig's tongue and four pig's feet in plenty of hot water. That means allow to come to almost a boil then drain, and wash in cold water. Put the meat to boil again, fully and freely covered with water, and simmer for at least five

has been cored but not pared. Cover closely and bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. Fhr.) for about 45 minutes or until meat is tender. Lift the chops and apples together from the baking dish onto a hot platter and remove toothpicks. Garnish with parsley and serve at once.

Lakota Club Salt Pork
 Buy one pound fat salt pork cut into thin slices and freshen in hot water five to eight minutes. Drain thoroughly and wipe dry. Dip in beaten egg, then in finely rolled cracker crumbs. After first three hours of cooking add salt, whole peppercorns, one half bay leaf, two whole onions, and take of the scum from time to time. Then take off flesh and remove firm bones put it in a basin and mix well. Be sure to have equal amounts of meat and gelatinous liquid in the moulds you are to fill. Strain over the flesh the juice and cooking liquor and put in cool place to set.

These headcheese will be found to be firm and to turn out readily when unmoulded. There is usually a ready market for well made and not too highly seasoned headcheese.

Pigs Feet: Fried, Pickled
 To prepare pigs' feet for either frying or pickling scrape and wash them thoroughly and tie each separately in a piece of cheese cloth. Put them into a kettle or stewpan, cover with boiling water and add the salt. Let the water boil up once, then set back on the fire and simmer for five hours. Cool in the cooking liquor. When cold proceed with preferred preparation.

FRIED PIGS FEET: 6 boiled pigs feet, salt and pepper, lemon juice, 1 egg bread crumbs. Split the feet and season well with salt, pepper and lemon juice. Dip in beaten egg, then in bread crumbs and fry five minutes in deep fat at 375 deg. Fhr. Drain and serve immediately with
