### "AT HOME IN MY DESK!"

In the course of a vigorous address at Brackley Point Road on Saturday night Mr. Angus McLean challenged the bona fides of the Liberal candidates on the automobile question. He charged them with misleading the public as to their real views and said the pledge they had signed was no more than a "scrap of paper" to be cast aside the moment the Liberal candidate had attained his purpose. He demanded of Mr. Chandler what had become of the pledge he had signed? Had he "delivered the goods" to Mr. Brodie? Mr. Chandler lamely and imply admitted he had not. Where is it, then? again demanded Mr. McLean. "At home in my desk", replied Mr. Chandler, a document which was received with an outburst of laughter in which the Chairman and everyone present joined except Mr. Chandler and his coterie of friends from Charlottetown.

What have the people of the Third District to say to this hypocrisy on the part of Mr. Chandler? Heretofore for the past fortnight he has been touring the country parading as a member of the Anti-automobile Association while all the time he has taken good care not to register any pledge whatever. In the event of Mr. Chandler being returned there would be nothing on record against him as an anti-automobilist and all his talk and protestations would count as merely so much "hot air" to delude the electorate.

How many more Grit candidates have their pledges securely locked up in their desks at home?

### MISLEADING THE FARMERS

The total revenue derived from taxation from Insurance and loan Companies, banks, commercial companies, income tax, succession duties, oyster leases, etc was

In 1914	70,171.43

Increase in 1914 \$47,100.75  
Not a cent of this was derived from increased taxation. It was the result of a more equitable adjustment of taxation on commercial companies, outside residents deriving income from the Province and increased prosperity of banks in consequence of which they paid increased taxation.

Yet the Grit candidates from one end of the country to the other have been quoting from a Patriot prepared document to the effect that the Government had increased the taxation of the farmers \$71,000.

It is a gross misrepresentation of the truth, and when Mr. McLean challenged Mr. Palmer and his friend Mr. Brodie to deny the accuracy of his statement that the revenue as shown in the Public Accounts had not benefited one cent from increased taxation on the farmers. Mr. Palmer and Mr. Brodie remained silent like convicted criminals.

What are honest, fair-minded people to think of such dastardly tactics and foul slanders on the part of candidates seeking their suffrages?

### EXIT DR DUMBA

The Government of the United States has acted as it was expected to act in asking Vienna to recall Dr. Dumba, the Ambassador to Washington from Austria-Hungary. The revelations as to his conduct were no more amazing than were the admissions he made, once indisputable evidence was secured of his perfidy.

Dr. Dumba has disgraced his country by conspiring secretly against American industry, as he has disgraced the high service in which he has engaged. His impudent attempt to brave the storm raised against him reveals him in a most unfavorable light. That made his departure a certainty, if it had been his only fault.

Count Von Bernstorff, the German Ambassador, must walk carefully from now on or he will follow his fellow-conspirator. That he deserves to go fully as much as Dr. Dumba is generally believed, but his crime of getting caught is not so flagrant as was that of the American envoy. Besides he is given credit at Washington for assisting towards an understanding between Germany and the United States by presenting to Berlin a faithful impression of the American viewpoint.

The dismissal of Dr. Dumba is notable as the first case in which the United States has taken drastic action in its dealings with the European belligerents. It illustrates a stiffening of the back on the part of the Washington Government which most observers think is manifested all too rarely and will be the more welcome for that.

Commenting on the incident The New York Times says:

"In the whole history of our relations with foreign countries there has never been another diplomatic representative at our national capital who has in such an open and unabashed way taken measures to make himself altogether unacceptable. Ambassador Dumba is guilty of a direct and grossly improper interference in our domestic affairs. The Vienna Government should at once see the necessity of a change in its representation at Washington."

### WHO SUPPLIED THE OATS?

The Patriot wants to know who supplied the oats that were bought with the money subscribed for the Field Oats Fund. It does not want the information, but it wants to suggest there was graft in the transaction. Well if it wants to dirty its own nest it is at liberty to do so. The greater portion of the oats was purchased by Mr. John Richards's Committee in Prince County, and Captain Joseph Read supplied them at 50 cents per bushel. Does the Patriot mean to imply that Mr. Richards or Captain Joseph Read would condescend to mean, contemptible conduct such as it suggests?

### GRIT LIES NAILED

The following are some of the Grit lies nailed to the counter since the campaign opened:

Mr. J. J. Hughes and The Patriot claimed the former obtained the subsidy of \$100,000.

The Patriot and its correspondents claimed that the railway gauge was not to be widened and that home labour was to be superseded by outside labour at Carleton.

The Patriot and its candidates denied the accuracy of the External Auditors' reports showing a reduction in debt of \$89,000.

Mr. Wheatley, a butcher who, according to his own showing enjoyed the patronage of the Liberal Government, stated there were no tenders advertised for supplies to the asylum, etc., and that the merchants on the patronage list obtained orders at their own or any figure.

Mr. Chandler claimed he was an out-and-out anti-automobilist pledged up to the hilt to the Anti-Automobile Association.

Mr. George E. Hughes, Mr. Bell and Mr. A. E. McLean protested they were opposed to oyster areas being leased.

The Patriot and Grit candidates have charged the Government with extravagance.

The Grit candidates claim that their party during the twenty-one years they were in power built certain public offices for which they should be given credit.

The Patriot and the Grit candidates claim they should be returned on the strength of their leader's manifesto.

The opposition to the present Government has one basis and one only, viz.—the Grit lawyers are anxious for office and preferment, and the Grit contractors are anxious to have their hands once more in the public treasury. Would any sensible elector vote against the best Government in the history of the province to oblige a horde of hungry Liberal lawyers and greedy Grit contractors?

The former at Mount Stewart and Mr. Nash at Pownal admitted that the credit was due entirely to the Mathieson Government.

Sir Robert Borden in a telegram to The Guardian denied these allegations as a foul slander on his administration.

Mr. Feehan showed at Corran Ban the reduction of interest paid by the present Government on borrowed money confirmed the report of the Auditors and left the critics not a leg to stand upon.

Premier Mathieson as Chairman of the Board proved that tenders were advertised in every instance and that Liberals as well as Conservatives were given contracts so long as they were men of repute and their goods up to the standard. Mr. Wheatley's tenders were rejected because they did not comply with the proviso.

In reply to Mr. A. A. McLean he confessed he had never sent any pledge to the Secretary or Mr. Brodie, but had it safely locked up in his desk at home.

It was proved that Mr. Hughes and Mr. McLean were themselves applicants for leases and that Mrs. J. H. Bell was a large leaseholder.

Mr. John Richards admitted there was not an item of expenditure he could reduce if he wished to and not a single candidate has given a single detail of any economy they could effect.

The Government candidates admit this but point out that allowing for this, the Grits spent only \$10,000 per annum on public works, whereas the Conservatives have spent \$50,000 per annum or five times as much as their opponents.

There is absolutely nothing in the manifesto which would justify the electors in putting any trust or confidence in them.
