Divorce Bill

May Hold Over

OTTAWA, May 11.—It is doubtful if the bill which has passed the Senate and which confers the powers of granting divorces on the Courts of Ontario and Prince Edward Island will pass this session, as it may not be reached. It is not a government measure, but a private bill, and is on a list in the order paper which will not be taken up unless the government specially sets aside a day for it, which is questionable. There will be strong opposition if the bill is proceeded with and under the circumstances it would not be difficult to talk it out. The Prime Minister's Legislative Bureau has demanded that so far as that province is concerned the act be withdrawn. They say the power is not wanted.

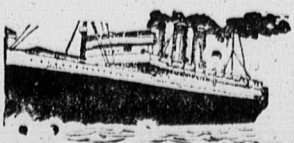

PRESBYTERY MEETING

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in Zion Church Hall on Tuesday, May 11th, and was regularly constituted by the Moderator Rev. Dr. McEwen, with whom were present Messrs. Miller, Martin, McKay, Greenleaves, Goodwill, Christie, McQuarrie, McLeod, Sweet, Marchison, Stirling, McEwen, Staver, McKenzie, Wood, D. W. McLeod, Sinclair, McLean, Ministers, and Messrs. Ramsey, Crozier, Whiteside, McLeod, McLure, Reynolds, Elders.

After the minutes had been read and assented to the Clerk read a list of general correspondence and Presbytery then proceeded to deal with the call of Mr. Lockhart to Souris. It was arranged to hold the service at Souris, on May 20th, at 7:30 p. m., Mr. J. M. McLeod to preside and induct, Mr. J. D. McKenzie to preach. Mr. Greenleaves to assist the minister and Mr. J. C. Martin, the people. Mr. Geo. E. Christie was appointed interior moderator for Montrose.

At request from Lower Montague with regard to the building of the a union church was referred to the Committee on co-operation with the Methodist Church. Messrs. Miller and McKenzie were asked to assist the Committee.

Mr. Greenleaves then reported having moved in a call from Murray Harbor North, in favor of Mr. John Murchison, and on his conduct being approved, delegates from both the congregations of Malpeque and Murray Harbor North were heard, Messrs. Reynolds and McLure for the latter and Messrs. Ramsey, Woodside and Crozier for the former. The call having been placed in Mr. Murchison's hands he signified a difficulty of deciding in the matter, and asked for time for consideration, the usual term being granted.

Mr. Martin spoke on the Divorce Bill and asked that a Committee be appointed to deal with the matter. Presbytery appointed Messrs. Miller, McLeod and Martin.

Mr. Goodwin referred to the fact that Mr. McQuarrie had attained the honor of winning the degree of B. D., and the brethren felicitated this promising young presbyter upon his success.

Matters relative to Marshfield were handed over to the Home Mission Committee. The call of Mr. McLellan to Valleyfield was then taken up and the following were appointed to officiate at the service at Valleyfield on July 15th, Mr. J. W. McKenzie to preach, Mr. N. D. McLeod to address the people, Mr. J. D. McKenzie the minister, Dr. McEwen to preside and induct.

Mr. McLean's report re P. E. I. Hospital was ordered forwarded to H. M. Committee. It being ascertained that Mr. Steward could not attend the General Assembly, Mr. McQuarrie was set down as substitute.

The Clerk was instructed to forward to Dr. Fullerton the sympathy of Presbytery and to assure him of their prayers for his speedy recovery. Presbytery then adjourned to meet at Souris on May 20th. GEO. C. TAYLOR, Clerk pro tem.

MEXICO CITY, via El Paso, Tex., May 12.—A "Man on horseback" rode into Mexico City Sunday noon General Alvaro Obregon, who fled from an apital alone, disguised in a braken rider's dress, in the early morning hours before dawn April 13 returned at the head of several thousand troops. From Tacubaya, a few miles southwest of Mexico City, the presidential candidate rode on a prancing bay stallion through the crowded streets, as far as the national palace.

HINTS FOR The Motorist

PAINTING AN ENGINE



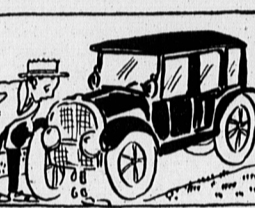
B. L. asks: It is all right to apply aluminum paint to an engine and, when dry, cover it with varnish to keep it from cracking. Is it necessary to put a new timer on a Ford car each season, if the old one is O. K.?

Answer: Aluminum paint is probably the best thing available, as it is hardly practicable to apply a baking enamel. The whole surface of the engine should be clean and absolutely free from oil or grease. Before applying the aluminum, if you can get a varnish that is capable of resisting considerable heat, it may help to hold the aluminum. The old timer should be continued in service until it begins to give trouble.

TRANSMISSION COMPOUNDS J. L. L. asks: It is advisable to use compounds containing soap, animal fat, resin, etc., in differentials and transmissions, or is a lubricant made from pure Pennsylvania stock the proper thing to use?

Answer: It is generally agreed that transmission compound should be, as far as possible of mineral origin, as animal fats, especially if with the call of Mr. Lockhart to Souris. EMERGENCY RADIATOR REPAIRS



A. G. writes: Twice, when my car was on the road the radiator commenced to leak. What is the best way to stop these leaks? Answer: Applying thick white lead or red lead freely around the point of escape often works well and in the case of honeycomb radiators, putty pressed into the leaking cells from both front and back, generally proves effective. Plaster of Paris in the form of a thick paste can also be used and we have seen temporary repairs made with heavy cup grease.
