REV. DR. MURPHY

Of St. Mary's Cathedral, Halifax, Dead.

SKETCH OF HIS LIFE.

Royal Canadians Inspected Yesterday by Major General Haley.

MGR. MURPHY DEAD.

HALIFAX, Nov. 4.—(Special).—Rev. Mgr. Murphy died this morning aged 58 years.

SKETCH OF HIS LIFE.

Rev. Dr. Murphy was a native of Cork. He was educated at All Hallows' College Dublin, and at St. Sulpice College, Montreal. Ordained to the priesthood in 1867, he became a professor in St. Mary's College, Halifax, and was afterwards President of that institution. He served also as secretary to the late Archbishop Hannan and to the present Archbishop O'Brien. On the death of Mgr. Power in 1887 he was chosen as Rector of St. Mary's Cathedral, Halifax. He was created a D. D. by the Pope, June, 1892.

A representative of the company stated yesterday, when asked regarding the reported purchase, that there was absolutely no truth in it. Capt. Troup, manager of the C. P. E. Coast Steamship service, has been in the east effecting the purchase of steamers for the Pacific Coast service, but the names of the boats he secured has not been announced.
