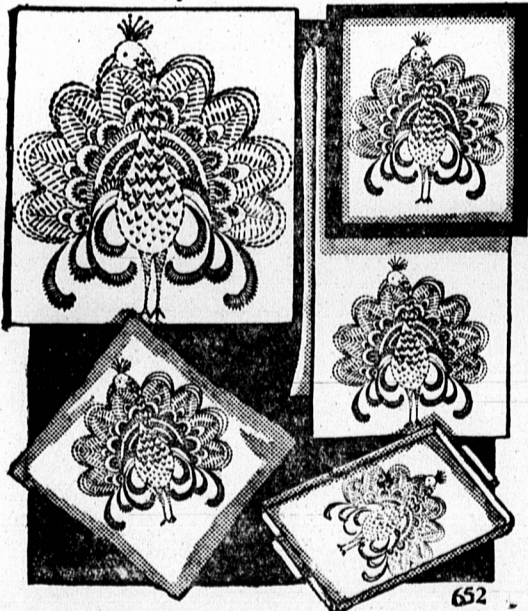

METZ, France, Oct. 5.—(AP)—A military tribunal today condemned a man, his wife and their two sons to 20 years prison terms on charges of espionage on behalf of Germany. The four, arrested in September, 1937, were Michel Bour, 50, his wife Marguerite, 45, both Germans, and their sons, Charles, 23, and Labert, 18.
