Red And Black Earn Right To Advance Further In Maritime Intercollegiate Play By 5-3 Victory.

MONTAGUE TUG OF WAR

Last Thursday's tug of war drew the largest house this year, topping the list with fourteen hundred people, which proves the increasing popularity of this sport. Four lightweight teams were eliminated. Zero hour was set for 8.30 and by that time Comrade R. McGregor had fulfilled his duty by having the right lightweight teams weighed in and ready for action. Victoria Cross, with 188 lbs and Murray River, with 198 lbs, were the first to grip the rope. In the first of the battle it seemed as though Victoria Cross was going to be the losers, holding their fire until their opponents were within four inches of victory, then under a given command, they captured victory for themselves. The battle lasted one min. 12 3/4 secs. In the second battle between these teams Victoria Cross opened with rapid fire annihilating Murray River in one min. 1-4 secs.

The next to come to the front were the Cardigan Head Browns and the Lower Montague Hoovers. This battle was a real back-braker, both sides showing good training and coaching. The first pull took 1 min. 52 1/4 sec. with Cardigan Head on the winning side. Lower Montague won the second pull in 1 min. 9 secs. but split unbroken, the dauntless Browns captured the third line in 1 min. 65 1/4 secs. Thus Lower Montague and Murray River were eliminated from the finals.

Next to take their places on the firing step were the High Bank Climbers and the Junior Potato Slingers. The Potato Slingers showed their starchy when they pulled the first two straight snaps, the first taking only 28 1/4 secs. and the second 1 min. 28 secs.

The last, but by no means the least, to do battle for the S. S. Hessian Trophy were the stalwart Valleyfield West Threshets and the no less stalwart Kilmuir Jrs. It was a tight action and the result was almost heart-breaking. As Comrade S. Nicholson gave the command "take the strain" the rope snapped like a whip cord in the hand of a trainer as both teams settled back. Grit and determination were written on each countenance and the word "go" every muscle was thrown as each team as one tremendous heave after another away each team as the swaying of a forest in a mighty gale. The noise and hubbub died away and silence prevailed among the spectators—a silence one could almost hear—broken at last by the shrill blast of the referee's whistle. The first pull between Valleyfield West and Kilmuir Juniors was over and Valleyfield West had won in 44 1/4 secs. Then it seemed as if the 1400 beholders had given vent to their pent up feelings as they broke into hilarious cheering, which was deafening. Kilmuir living up to the splendid traditions of their forefathers and undaunted by defeat came back with the full force of their Scotch blood and won the second pull in 1 min. 5 1/2 secs. only to be overpowered in the third pull in 25 secs., leaving four teams in the running for the big event next Thursday evening. These teams are scheduled to compete for the Hessian Trophy in the following order:

Victoria Cross vs Cardigan Head, Valleyfield West vs Junior Potato Slingers. Winners of the first vs. the winners of the second, the winners of the trophy will go to Bedeque on Nov. 10th, to compete for the Dr. Grant Trophy.

Entries for the Provincial Heavyweight championship, to take place Nov. 10th, closes Nov. 1st at 3 p.m. A.S.T.

Americans Cut Down Squad As N.H.L. Season Nears

By Guardian's Special Wire) OSHAWA, Ont., Oct. 29.—Manager Joe Simpson of the New York Americans of the National Hockey League has started the weeding-out process with his squad of prospects in training at the arena here. Following the first week of practice, Simpson announced today that Red U'an has been transferred to the Boston Bruins of the N. H. L., and that three other players have been sent to International League teams. Hal Picketts, of last year's Americans, has gone to Syracuse of the International League and Red Jackson, another of last year's squad, has been sent down to New Haven of the Canadian-American League. Roy Worters was a sure starter in goal, and figures on using Alex Smith, last year with the Bruins; Al Murray, Red Dutton and Bill Bryrgas for defence work. He probably will keep Dave Schriener, last season with Syracuse, in the goal. There are plenty of forwards to choose from, with Bob Gracie, formerly with the Toronto Maple Leafs, as the outstanding newcomer. Others sure to be retained are Normie Himes, Rabbit McVeigh, Dede Klein, Eddie Burke, Art Chapman and Red Conn.

MCMANUS AND WEBSTER SIGN WITH MAROONS

(G. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) WINNIPEG, Oct. 29.—Aubrey Webster and Sammy McManus, stars with Moncton Hawks last year, signed tonight to play professional hockey with Montreal Maroons of the National Hockey League.

Tommy Gorman, manager of Maroons, made the announcement late tonight when negotiations were completed. Webster, a right winger, and McManus, a left winger, will don Maroon uniforms tomorrow night to play in the second exhibition game between Maroons and New York Rangers, both training here.

Winnipeg, Oct. 29.—Montreal Maroons and New York Rangers worked skillfully at their training camps here today and after practice Tommy Gorman of Maroons was asked over the line showing versatile Lionel Conacher made in his first strenuous play. Conacher, nationally known athlete and former rear-guard for the world's champion Chicago Black Hawks, entered the Maroon camp after a few days rest on conclusion of a hard gridiron season in Eastern Canada to become the key-man of the Maroon defence and lead many offensive plays. Rangers devoted their day's training to one workout while Maroons held ice scrummages in the morning then played ball and completed their training with track exercises.

Tommy Gorman tried each player at the penalty shot. Jimmie Ward, Maroon first stringer, an amateur Sammy McManus were good at the most recent National Hockey League innovation. On the ice, Maroons went through a fast skating practice and in scrimmage concentrated on back checking and defensive work. It was doubtful whether Sammy McManus and Aubrey Webster, last season's Moncton Hawk wingmen would turn professional for tomorrow night's Maroon encounter with Rangers in the second exhibition of a three game series, however Gorman stated the two players may be signed tonight.

Boston Club Open Exhibition Series With 2-1 Win — Crutchfield And Gagnon Stage Mix-up.

B., Oct. 29.—The first game ever played in Saint John by two National Hockey League teams was seen tonight when Boston Bruins gained a 2-1 edge over Montreal Canadiens in the first of four exhibition matches scheduled for the Maritime Provinces and Quebec City.
