INCREASES IN SUPPLEMENTS

NORTH CARLETON,

The annual meeting passed off satisfactorily. The rate-payers were well pleased with the teacher, Miss Ellice Laird and voted her \$20 supplement, an increase of \$5 from last year.

WOODSTOCK,

At the annual meeting of the Woodstock District, a hearty vote of thanks was tendered to A. A. Lefurgey, M. P., for the maps of the British Empire and of Canada, so kindly donated by him to this school.

ORWELL GOVE

The annual school meeting, District No 131, was held here. The amount voted for supplement was \$15, an increase of \$5, for other purposes \$40. The trustees are: L. R. Ings, D. R. McDonald, D. W. McLeod, N. A. Gillis, Secretary.

CLYDE RIVER.

A very successful meeting of the rate-payers of Clyde River School District was held. \$35.00 was voted, \$40.00 for supplement to teacher's salary and \$45.00 for running expenses. Mr. McDougall will be retained as teacher. R. A. McPhail was appointed trustee in place of John D. Crahan, retired.

NORTH ST. ELEANORS.

Annual school meeting was held after being advertised. Ratepayers expressed perfect satisfaction with teacher and increased the supplement from \$20.00 to \$40.00. Hubert Howatt, Duncan McCallum and Geo. Inman are the trustees for the ensuing term.

KINGSBOROUGH

The annual school meeting was not large but harmonious. There is more interest taken in education than usual in this section of country. The following sums were voted for the ensuing year: \$20.00 for supplement, \$20.00 for contingencies and \$7.75 for map. Ira Brown has resigned as teacher.

ALBANY.

The annual school meeting was held and Gilbert Bell appointed chairman. Lem Dawson was elected trustee in place of A. W. Cameron, retired. The sum of \$50.00 was voted for Walter Crockett, teacher, and \$40.00 for running expenses, making a total of \$90. The rate-payers were very lucky in securing such a good teacher as Mr. Crockett.

MILLVIEW.

A goodly number of the ratepayers of the district were present at the annual school meeting, Joseph Acorn being called to the chair. A statement of the business transactions of the past year was submitted by the secretary and approved of by the meeting. The trustees for the ensuing year are: Alex. Drake, A. J. Hynes, and Joseph Story, re-elected. Miss Maggie V. Gillis who has had charge of the school for the past year has been engaged for the ensuing year. A supplement of \$25.00 was unanimously voted the teacher which attests to the efficiency and popularity of Miss Gillis.

DARLINGTON

There was a good attendance of rate-payers present. Andrew Wyand occupied the chair and D. E. Campbell acted as secretary. D. E. Campbell being the retiring trustee was re-elected. The trustees are Donald McPherson, Malcolm Cumming and D. E. Campbell. The present teacher, Miss Blanche Balderston having resigned, Miss Clara Balderston was unanimously chosen as her successor. There was no supplement voted. The sum of only \$15 was voted for running expenses, there being a balance on hand from last year. Spring and fall vacations are adopted as most suitable for Darlington. The majority of the rate-payers of Darlington being Conservatives believe in economy and living within their income and keeping clear of deficits.

MONTROSE

David Gordon presided. James J. Gillis was appointed trustee, John F. Graid retiring from office. Thirty dollars was voted as supplement and fifty dollars for repairs. During the holidays the school will be thoroughly repaired. Sincere thanks was returned to A. A. Lefurgey, M. P. for his donation of the map of the Dominion of Canada.

GREENVALE

The annual meeting was held in Greenvale school with Simon Brown in the chair. The following are the trustees for the ensuing year: A. D. McPherson, Edwin Carew and Simon Brown. The sum of \$50 was voted for teacher's supplement and \$55 for current expenses. The rate-payers have secured the services of Joseph S. DeRoche for the ensuing year.

MURRAY HARBOR NORTH.

At the annual meeting Wm. Reid was appointed chairman and C. D. McClure, secretary. Wm. Condon was appointed trustee in place of James Daniel who wished to retire. The following sums were voted: supplement \$40, fuel and contingent expenses \$25. The supplement was voted provided the present teacher Mr. Campbell remain, which he consented to do.

MOUNT HERBERT

The annual school meeting was held with Sampson Farquharson in the chair. The present trustees are George McKensie, Francis Driscoll and Thomas Wood, the last being elected in David Match's place. A supplement of \$30 was voted and \$20 for the school expenses. A teacher will be engaged for six months as it is expected by that time the Consolidated school at Mount Herbert will be ready.

RED POINT.

John McEllan, the retiring trustee, was re-elected trustee and secretary. The amount of \$25.00 was voted for all school purposes. The meeting was large and enthusiastic. A vote of thanks was tendered the trustees and secretary for their indefatigable efforts to provide a schoolhouse among the best in the country with a graded yard, and enclosed with a substantial wire fence. Miss Susie Smith is to be re-engaged for her third year.

HOPE RIVER

The meeting passed off very quietly. The supplement voted for the coming year was increased to \$31. \$30 was voted for current expenses. The school grounds were enclosed during the past year with a substantial wire fence and the children celebrated Arbor day this spring by planting trees and flowers. Miss Joanna McKay, the teacher, has given good satisfaction and is likely to remain another year. It would only be justice to teachers and scholars if the rate-payers in every District would have the school grounds enclosed so that they might be made beauty spots by planting trees, shrubs and giving the children a chance to cultivate flowers.

CA'UMPEC.

W. H. Smith was elected chairman and undersigned acted as secretary. Miner Bridges retired and W. H. Smith was elected trustee in his place. After the adopting of minutes and accounts of previous year the sum of \$20.00 was voted for fuel and contingent expenses. The application of Miss Geraldine Sweet as teacher, was put to a vote of meeting and unanimously accepted. It will be remembered that Miss Sweet took one of the scholarships for Prince Co. two years ago and passed a creditable examination at Prince of Wales College this year. The district should feel proud in securing the services of a brilliant scholar and will no doubt make equally as successful a teacher. R. H. Rayner, secretary.

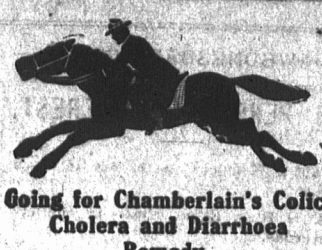

A By-Law for allowing a rate of discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general Civic purposes for the Current Year ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D., 1904.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows: 1st, a discount at the rate of 2 1/2% shall be allowed all tax payers who shall on or before the 25th day of July, next, A. D., 1904 pay to the City Clerk, at his office the taxes severally due by them for the current year as real estate and personal property for Civic purposes. FRED. F. KELLY, Mayor. W. W.
