CHANGES IN THE MAP.

When the war in South Africa began, the GUARDIAN in common with some other loyal journals predicted that the final result would be a new map of that country in which both the Orange Free State and the Transvaal Republic would be hereafter portrayed in British colors. That prediction was repeated with all confidence in the dark days of December and January last when the progress of the British forces had been checked by a series of reverses, when the enemy was still occupying our invaded soil and besieging our cities.

We now begin to realise the expectations and hopes which to some minds were clouded and uncertain. Lord Roberts' masterly generalship, his swift and overpowering attack has changed the situation, dashed the hopes of the enemy and given to British arms a series of triumphs. Not only has the enemy been everywhere driven out of the British territories and our beleaguered cities rescued, but the Orange State has been in deed and fact added to the British possessions. Our national boundary has been moved northward from the Orange River to the Vaal River and all south of the Vaal has become British. So far the map of South Africa has been already potentially changed.

Already Lord Roberts is far north of the Vaal and has captured and occupied Johannesburg. Other forces advancing from the west are moving toward the same centre, so that already all the southeastern section of the Transvaal state is under control of our armies. The section now occupied includes more than one-third of the white population of the Republic, and probably three-fourths or more of its wealth. Pretoria, although not yet actually occupied, is believed to be within Lord Roberts' grasp. The Boer defence, sadly shattered by the capture of Cronje, has practically broken down. No one either within or without the Dutch Republic now doubts what the end must be. Lord Salisbury has stated that no vestige of the Transvaal Government's authority shall remain, and Lord Roberts has abundant force at his disposal to give effect to the mandate.

So we may anticipate that very soon the annexation of the Transvaal will be proclaimed as an accomplished fact. Our national boundaries in South Africa will then be extended northward from the Vaal to the Limpopo River, there to touch no foreign domain, but to form a mere provincial boundary in one vast British South Africa. For north of the Limpopo is the vast British territory of Rhodesia, and to the north of that again is British Central Africa, which again is almost in touch with the British Equatorial Provinces. It will be seen that Lord Roberts is reconstructing the map of South Africa on an extensive scale.

As yet we have no intimation whether the Government will or will not introduce a Prohibitory Liquor Bill.

At the police court yesterday Terrence McIntee and John White were each fined \$2 or 10 days for drunkenness.

There is a dearth of war news this morning, but important news must come soon. No doubt Lord Roberts is very busy just now.

Mr. Pineau has spoken, meeting with a flat denial the charge that he was bought by the Liberals. Quite naturally the Opposition are not yet satisfied.

P. W. C. CONVOCATION.

The Valedictory Read by Mr. Arthur Cameron—
Speeches by Prominent Men.

MRS L. E. PROWSE PRESENTS THE UNION JACK

Prominent Ladies and Gentlemen on the Platform—The College Yells and Patriotic Songs Enlivened the Scene and all the Students as Happy as a Family.

The Opera House was filled to enjoy the commencement exercises of Prince of Wales College. Dr. Anderson in his usual happy manner presided. On the platform were His Honor Lieut. Governor McIntyre and Lady, His Worship Mayor Warburton, Mrs. L. E. Prowse, and Hon. Messrs. Gordon and Shaw.

The choruses were heartily rendered and the different numbers on the program were gone through with very creditably. Mr. Guy Cameron on account of a severe cold was unable to give his essay on King Lear which was much regretted. On account of the absence of Mr. Belleau the duet in which he was to assist Miss Earle had to be passed over, much to the regret of the audience.

The valedictory was read by Mr. Arthur Cameron. A different air prevailed this number from that of former years. Since last year's valedictory was given the beautiful new College building has been opened which must be a source of satisfaction to students and professors alike. A system of drill has also been introduced which must be a benefit physically as well as being a means to better discipline. A beautiful flag engraved with the Prince's feather and inscribed with the name Prince of Wales College, and of course bearing the Union Jack was presented by Mrs. L. E. Prowse. Mr. Roy Connors in behalf of the college staff and students made a suitable reply. Dr. Anderson also spoke a few words of thanks to the giver of such a beautiful and suitable present. At conclusion of presentation Soldiers of the Queen was beautifully sung by Miss Amy Earle, the students joining in the chorus. Miss Florrie Earle also sang a solo very acceptably.

Mr. A. Peters, M. L. A., who was to address the graduates, was not present. Mr. Gordon was introduced by

Dr. Anderson and spoke a short time reviewing the past of Prince of Wales College and comparing it with the present. He pointed out to the students that with greater opportunities and enlarged facilities which were theirs in view of the beautiful new college lately given them, and since former students of old Prince of Wales had done honor to their native province it was theirs to improve their privileges and give a good account of themselves.

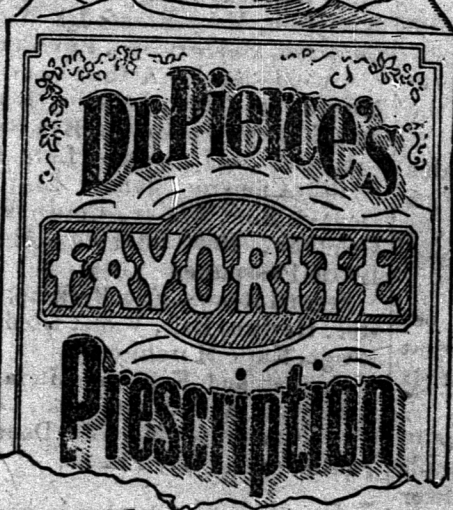
Mr. Shaw being called upon, gave some excellent advice to those of the students who would now go out into the world to engage in the noble calling of teaching the youth of the land. He congratulated them on the success of their year's studies and reminded them that in the work of teaching the opportunities for doing good are unlimited.

His Honor Governor McIntyre gave an address congratulating Doctor Anderson and D. J. McLeod Supt. of Education on the honors lately conferred on them. It must be highly gratifying to the gentlemen and their many friends to receive the well-merited degree of L.L.D. His Worship Mayor Warburton was the last speaker. As an old student of Prince of Wales it gave him much pleasure to be at their commencement exercises. He paid a high tribute to Dr. Anderson as a teacher, but deplored his giving his speakers such short notice as he had only had a few moments warning that he was expected to make a speech. Of course the College yell was in evidence and the audience were treated to several ear-splitting outbursts of applause.

VALEDICTORY.

Around the close of the College term are clustered many traditions, and none is more imperative than the custom of reading a Valedictory at the Commencement Exercises for the purpose of giving a short sketch of the students' toils and aspirations; and in the exercises of this evening there is brought to a close the most memorable session in the history of Prince of Wales.

Forty years ago the College was established and although for a long time the old building met the requirements of the students, the increased attendance during the last number of years necessitated the erection of a new building, which after some delay was finally completed and ready for occupation, February the fifth, on which day students and professors said farewell to the old College and took possession of the new Prince of Wales.
