EASTERN NOTES. The spring work is completed, and the potatoe bug is now beginning to attract the farmers' attention. Last season from climate and other unfavorable conditions, their ravages were comparatively small, and little or no Paris green was used in these parts, and contrary to usual conditions since the arrival of this pest in the Provinces no reinforcements arrived from our sea to augment the myriads at work in our fields. But this season the old order of things is returning, and fresh battalions are thrown on our shores in a comatose condition, but if the day is warm and the sand hot animation soon returns, vigor and powers of locomotion are restored, and they wing their way inland to assist their insular friends to annoy, and harass the farmer. Where come they may naturally be asked, probably from the mountains of Mabon, the rocks of Judique, or the vales of Nova Scotia. What do they leave the succulent potatoe tops that grow in these enchanting regions and trust themselves to the wind and waves, to be finally cast on the shores of that Island, visible on the northern horizon? Will some one better versed in natural history than your correspondent answer. Why don't they drown? Will some of the natural history club in your city, tell us. While all land animals prolong their existence in water but for a short period, here is an animal neither aquatic in his nature nor amphibious in his nature that will live for days, probably weeks, immersed in salt water, buffeted by the waves and shaken by the currents, and that his condition is not one of insensibility is proved by the fact that fishermen find them miles to sea, perched on their buoys, and climbing their flag staffs to get a dry position. Their anatomic structure must certainly be different from the rest of the animal creation, especially those of utility to man.—Coffishing is about over for the season, and bait is not in it. The catch was fair on the south side as far west as Black Pond, not much west from that. The quality is the best for years. The fishermen are now preparing them for market and renewing their lines for hake, a school of which will soon be arriving on the southern side of the Point.—The two cheese factories are doing well and a considerable increase in the milk at Red Point factory. Every morning four well-laden teams arrive on time, Hugh McLean driving the western one, Daniel McEachern the northern, John J. Campbell and William Young the eastern. William Young handled the eastern milk himself last year, but notwithstanding his capacity for work he could not handle it all this year.—The body of young Beatson drowned at East Point has not been recovered and probably never will.—Stephen Rose, sick for some time, is much improved in health.—James Stewart, South Lake, still keeps poorly.—Eddie McLellan has arrived home from Boston, the first of our Islanders this season, more to follow.

THE demise of John Pigott.—Savage Harbor In the rush and hurry of life we scarcely pause to notice our unfortunate companions who fall by the way side. If missed at all it is but for a little while. Each presses forward to the goal of his own desire giving little thought to those who shall no longer walk in the accustomed paths, or mingle in the familiar style. It makes little difference how loved, how admired, how trusted he may have been, who has just joined "the innumerable throng" who has taken their abode in the silent halls of death. The grass grows over his grave as though nature strove to blot out all traces of his existence, and even in the hearts of those who knew him best and loved him most, he soon becomes a fading memory. "He lived, he acted his part, now he is gone and the great stream of human life is too busy to take much thought of the dead. The tale is so familiar, we have heard it repeated so often that its iteration scarcely arouses a momentary thought. Even when one dies who has been remarkable among his fellows his exit from life scarcely causes a ripple on the surface of human affairs. He was; he is not; this is all. It would be difficult to say too much in praise of this noble hearted man whose character was beyond reproach whose love for his children, kindness to all, and above all his strict devotion to Holy Church combined to make him an exemplary member of the community. That he was loved and respected by his friends, neighbors and relatives was fully evidenced on the morning, when his funeral, followed by a large concourse of people slowly wended its way to the cemetery where the last rites were performed by Rev. A. Craise. But now all is over. A generous character a noble hearted man has gone to his reward. His cherry smile, the kindly word, and the friendly grasp of his hand will be no longer seen heard or felt. In the graveyard of his native parish his body has been laid to rest while his soul has sped away to a brighter and happier sphere. 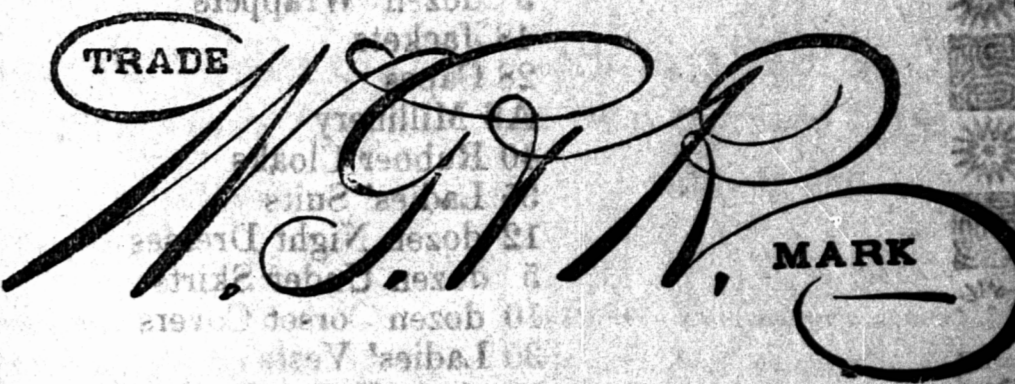
