The doctor in discussing the character and training of the boy, dwelt first on the influence of the mother. The boy is two-thirds mother, he said, physiologically and psychologically. He spoke plainly about the immodest dress worn by women, of the effect of this upon the present generation and the ultimate effect upon the boy. The father too did not escape censure as he is too prone to coddle his sons and afterwards suffer for his softness. Today boys are swimming with one foot on the shore. In days gone by they did not have the easy time that they have today. Many boys have too much idle time on their hands driving their father's cars, the father supplying the gas and oil. The doctor's address was featured throughout by keen flashes of humor and clever anecdotes. Unmistakably told and made a splendid impression on the meeting. Rotarian Frank Stewart presided today, and the guests present were W. H.
