Nazis claim 12-ship British Convoy sunk

BERLIN, Sept. 25 (AP)—The most high command claimed tonight almost complete destruction of a 12-ship British-bound convoy off West Africa, declared that a new and secret Nazi U-boat technique had made the convoy system increasingly vulnerable and said almost 1,000,000 tons of British shipping have been sunk since the start of the Russian war.

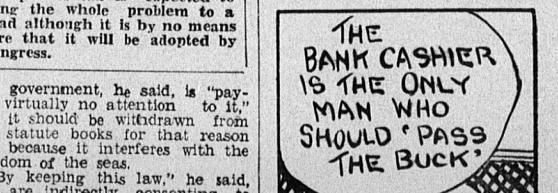
