This race track has just been completed and is the only one on the island to be built on the lines of the race tracks in the West, which in racing terms is called "a track without a pocket," and enables the horses behind the pole to hold their positions without crowding. Mr. Milligan is offering some good purses this year. It is pleasing to see that interest is being revived in racing in the west of the Province. With a race track at Northam and another at Alberton not to mention the Summerside track, which is one of the finest on the island, some good meets are to be expected this year.—S

—NORTHAM RACES IN JULY—Mr. J. E. Milligan, of Messrs. Milligan and Morrison, was in the city yesterday discussing arrangements for the Northam Race Meeting, scheduled for July 15th. An old resident of the Oak Valley district passed away on Sunday the 10th inst., in the person of Samuel Llewellyn, whose serious illness was noted in these columns a few times in the past week. The deceased was born in Gaspereaux over 83 years ago and had for many years resided on the farm where he breathed his last. The funeral took place from his late home on Wednesday afternoon, the 13th inst. Services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. P. Watson Currie, of the Presbyterian Church, here where the deceased had attended many years, while health and strength permitted. ### SALES RECORDS

(C. E. MacKenzie) I am sure if one were to ask the manager of any successful business concern what he considered the most important item in his business records, that he would readily answer that the "Record of Sales" was the key-stone in his arch of success. Successful agents in all branches keep records of all calls and business done at all times. These show at a glance the date of every transaction, together with sufficient data about the deal to bring everything back to the minds of those concerned. In fact it is a simple, ready reckoner of all business done, and goes a long way in straightening out any differences which may arise or in tracing up all articles which have been sold. Most farmers are not bookkeepers, but the simple fact that they are not is scarcely sufficient reason for their neglecting what is a valuable asset to their business. While every up-to-date farm should have a thorough system of bookkeeping it is absolutely necessary that a record of sales be kept, especially on stock farms such as we have in this province. If a farmer has pure bred animals of any kind a record of sales giving the name, number, and age of the animal disposed of, the sire and dam of the animal with the new owner's name and address as well as price received. A small ruled book suitable for such a record can be purchased at small cost, and would prove a time and money saver almost every month of the year. It is often no easy matter to trace such transactions a year or two after they have happened, and all registration papers have been forwarded with the animals. How handy it would be to have a sales record book with all the necessary information at hand. This same feature could be extended to departments of farm activity other than pure bred stock. For that matter all sales could be kept on record in such a manner. It is not advanced bookkeeping by any means, but it is a record system which tends to lead up to a better and wider system, where every activity of the farm may be in-
