FRANK GOTCH'S CAREER. Champion Wrestler had 331 Matches and Lost only Seven of Them. Frank Gotch, who announced his permanent retirement from the mat the other day, has proved himself the greatest wrestling champion since the days of Jack Carkeek. Gotch has had 331 matches, since he started in 1898, in 1898, not counting many minor affairs, and of this number he lost seven, five of them being handicap matches, in which he failed to throw his man as many times as bargained for.

They were to have met in Australia, but this, too, fell through. Gotch then defeated Dr. B. F. Roller, and his last big match was with Zubzko, whom the promoters brought from Europe to defeat the champion. Gotch beat him so easily that the giant Pole returned to Europe without bothering about a return match.

Of late George Hackenschmidt had expressed himself as willing to meet Gotch again for the title, but the announcement from the champion indicates that all chance of Hack getting a chance again is gone. Frank has been a good, clean wrestler and he has plenty of money to enjoy life with, besides being a large land owner in Iowa, where he says he will remain and be a champion farmer.

THE HUMAN VOICE.

Its Sound to its Owner and to His Friends.

That a man does not hear his own voice as all the best of the world hears it is shown by an interesting experiment described by Dr. L. Laloy in La Nature of Paris. Says this writer:

"If a person records on a phonograph a few sentences pronounced by himself, together with orders by his friends, and causes the machine to reproduce these at the end of a brief period, it generally happens that he easily recognizes his friends' voices, but not his own. On the other hand, the friends recognize his voice perfectly. This singular fact proves that everyone hears his own voice differently from others.

"As is remarked by Prof. Exner, the difference must lie in the quality of the tone. It must be remembered that one hears his own voice not only through the air, as do his auditors, but across the solid parts situated between the organs of speech and those of hearing. The sound thus produced has a different timbre from that conducted to the ear by the air alone.

"We may show this as follows: Take the end of a wooden rod between the teeth and pronounce a vowel continuously. Let the other end be alternately taken between the teeth and released by another person, who at the same time stops his ears. The latter will find that every time he seizes the rod in his teeth the sound becomes stronger than when it reaches his ear through air alone, and has a different quality. The experiment may be varied by applying a wooden rod to the larynx of the person observed and touching it from time to time to the observer's own larynx. As in the preceding case, it will be found that its passage through a solid body augments the intensity of the sound and modified its quality."

LAMP SHADES. A lamp has undeniably a much pleasanter and cozier glow than the irrepresible gas or electric light. It is also, as a rule, much more becoming to the average person. A soft glow from a prettily shaded lamp imparts a certain beauty to every woman, however homely. Rose pink is a most flattering color for a lamp shade, and is warranted to take ten years from a woman's real age much more readily than will a full course of hair dye and rouge. Heliotrope and the violet shades are more trying to the average complexion, and green is positively dreadful, as it is apt to impart a most unhealthy hue to the face.

A high central chandelier is always trying to the eyes and gives a stiff effect to even the coziest rooms; side brackets are always most desirable, even when the central lights must be turned on a little to give a sufficient amount of light. Never have a glass light arranged directly opposite to the most comfortable chairs in the drawing room, or the guests will be half-blinded by the light and will feel awkward and at a disadvantage. Instead of that place a pretty lamp on a table at one side of the chair, or else have a fancy shade of some kind adjusted to protect the victim's eyes.
