ROMÉ, Dec. 22.—A shipboard romance between the Indian prince and the ship's stenographer is to result in their marriage, it was announced today.

NEW YORK, Dec. 22—Attorneys for petitioning creditors involved in the Insub utility receivership proceedings resumed their legal battle yesterday in a hearing to determine ownership of \$30,000,000 in the securities of the bankrupt utility system.

The securities, it was pointed out yesterday before Federal Receiver Joyce, are held by various New York banks as collateral for loan made to Samuel Insub. Creditors who are acting under a court order issued in Chicago, asserted that the New York banks knew of the infirm condition of the Insub companies at the time when the loan were granted and have no right to sell the collateral. It should be put into the general assets of the company, they maintain.
