A DOUBLE ECONOMY

Economy and efficiency are two things that the world is getting home as a result of the war. Waste is always a loss; inefficiency is worse. Industry that stands up against the conditions imposed by the war must be efficient. Canadian manufacturers are testing themselves out in efficiency. They are under an economic contract to produce what Canadian consumers need to buy. A factory or a plant that might have been ninety per cent. efficient before the war, is a hundred per cent. efficient now. When the whole country hums along on the full tide of prosperity it is easy to hold every department. When the tide turns the weak business lets go. It is no longer able to compete.

The economy of buying goods made in this country is a double economy. It means the efficiency of our manufacturing industries as a whole and that means no unemployment and the return of good times. It means also in individual cases an actual saving in dollars and cents to the individual consumer because he gets as good or better value for the same money or, in many cases, gets as good or a better article at less cost. There must be no question as to the relative value of the goods. The Canadian-made article must be the equal of its competitor. It can be bought for less money, because it does not have to take away from the quality in order to meet the Canadian price, nor add to the price in order to make the same relative profit on goods of the same quality.

If the Canadian-made article is not at least as good value for the same money as anything imported it has no right to ask for the made in Canada preference. 6699
