## Toronto Defeats Boston Bruins 1-0

### Canadiens And Rangers Play Three All Draw — Detroit Ousts Maroons From Playoff.

FORUM, Montreal, Que., Mar. 28.—Lester Patrick's New York Rangers edged the Montreal Canadiens out of the Stanley Cup hockey series by holding the Flying Frenchmen to a 3-3 tie here tonight. Rangers captured the round 8-5 and qualified to meet Detroit's Red Wings in the second round.

Canadiens went down fighting gamely against elimination. Facing a three-goal deficit at the start of the game following a 5-2 defeat in New York in the first game Sunday, the Red Shirts flashed a magnificent attack at the start of the game tonight and rattled three goals into the Rangers' net. Rangers were back checking closely and fought back desperately. As Canadiens tired, Rangers forged ahead and one by one ran in three goals. As Canadiens flashed their final suprt with five forwards on the ice, a goal down and five minutes to go, Cecil Dillon drilled two goals past Hainsworth and guaranteed Rangers a playoff place in the next round.

**MAROONS AT DETROIT**  
DETROIT, Mich., March 28.—Flashing from behind after their opponents had scored two quick goals in the second period, Detroit's amazing Red Wings ousted the big Montreal Maroon team from the Stanley Cup hockey playoffs tonight, winning the deciding contest 3-2. The match sent the Red Wings into the semi-finals of the league playoffs against New York Rangers. The Maroons, trailing by a 2-0 Rew Wing victory, in Montreal last Saturday night, put on their power plays for 60 minutes. A scoreless first period passed, then Hooley Smith, Maroon star center, blasted his way through to take Connacher's pass and beat John Ross Roach, two minutes later Smith hooked a pass from Wentworth to beat Roach again, and the Maroons appeared headed for victory.

Late in the second period Herb Lewis took a double pass from F. Carlson and J. Sorrell to score. Then, three minutes after the third period opened, Eddie Goodfellow beat Dave Kerr in the Maroon nets.

Late in the period while the Maroons were frantically driving into Detroit ice for a goal, Johnny Gallagher got away alone, sped down the ice to pass Connacher on the Maroon defense, and win the hockey game.

### Happy Crowd Got Many Laughs From Unique Events. Efforts Were Appreciated.

The Charlottetown firemen in their benefit performance at the Forum last evening upheld their reputation of always presenting a programme of good, clean fun. In fact the affair was one big laugh from beginning to end. The crowd had scarcely time to recover from one peal until it found itself in the midst of another.

If the Government's proposals were executed the veterans fear that "the bad example will be followed by provincial and municipal authorities and by employers of labor generally." Such a tendency has for years been held in check only by the steadfast example of the Dominion Government.

"To the extent that the employers of labor take advantage of pension payment in the calculation of wages, to such extent payment of pensions will necessarily be subverted from the disabled men to the benefit of such employers," the memorandum says. "In other words, the Pension Act will be diverted from its proper function to the purpose of subsidizing employers of labor."

The memorandum is signed by Major J. S. Roper, M. C. Dominion President of the Canadian Legion. Col. W. C. H. Wood, Dominion President of the Army and Navy Veterans in Canada, Rev. Sidney E. Lambert, Dominion President of the Amputations Associations of the Great War, Frank C. J. McDonagh, for the Canadian Pensioners Association, and Captain E. A. Baker, N. C., for the Sir Arthur Pearson Club for blinded sailors and soldiers.

## Toronto Fans Impressed With Moncton Hawks

### Coach Nicklin Sends Crew Through Stiff Workout At Maple Leaf Gardens—Len Burrage To Get Into Fray Tonight.

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, March 28.—Following a stiff work-out at Maple Leaf Gardens today, Percy Nicklin, crafty coach of Moncton Hawks, pronounced his players in perfect condition for the opening contest of the two-game eastern championship series with Niagara Falls tomorrow.

Members of the Moncton team hail the return of Len Burrage to the lineup after an absence of more than a month. The big defenceman has fully recovered from a shoulder injury and his presence will strengthen the team for the Cataract series immeasurably. Burrage's brilliance on attack coupled with his defensive ability is an inspiration to the remainder of the team, the coach said.

All 12 players were in uniform as the coach ordered a brief work-out this afternoon. Railbirds were greatly taken with the speed displayed by the visitors and impressed by the reserve material carried by Coach Nicklin. Both forward lines appeared of equal strength, showing a pretty passing attack that will prove troublesome to Niagara Falls.

Nicklin expressed confidence in the ability of his boys to survive the eastern title series and earn a trip to Vancouver to meet the western winner with the Allan Cup at stake. The coach is the only casualty on the squad as he is suffering from a severe cold.

The coach is a former defence partner of Ching Johnson, bulwark of New York Rangers. Nicklin left his home town, Fort William, to join Winnipeg Argos in 1918 and, the next season, held down a defence berth with Johnson as a member of the Monarchs in the Manitoba Capital.

In 1920, Nicklin, Johnson and "Perk" Galbraith, now a veteran of Boston Bruins, left Winnipeg to join the Eveleth, Minn., club. Nicklin remained in Eveleth till 1925, spent a few seasons at Fort Frances, Ont., and undertook the coaching job at Moncton last year.

General opinion here tonight ranked the Hawks as favorites to win the eastern title because of their victory over the highly-touted Montreal Royals. Niagara Falls, however, eliminated a classy field in winning the Ontario crown and must be given careful consideration, the experts say.

## War Veterans Protest

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, March 28.—Regretting their inability to concur "in any respect" with the proposal of Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Finance Minister, to suspend pensions to war pensioners in the employ of the Government, the Associated Veterans today presented to the Prime Minister a memorandum constituting their "Bill of Rights." The veterans emphasize their loyalty to Canada and also declare that if it is made clear to them that a national emergency exists they are prepared to meet the government and canvass the whole situation with respect to pensions. At the same time, however, they make it a condition that "the principle of equality of sacrifice is applied to all classes of citizens in the Dominion."

In connection with demands that sacrifices should be made, the veterans remind the Government that "men disabled in the Great War continue to make sacrifices. (Canadian Press) TORONTO, March 28.—Reports prepared for the annual meeting of the Board of Evangelism and Social Service of the United Church of Canada here Wednesday indicate increased delinquency in years of economic distress in the seven redemption homes in Truro, Moncton, Georgetown, Winnipeg, Calgary and Vancouver.
