YESTERDAY the market received a fair attendance. Hay sold at 45c. One load of oats sold at 34. Butter was 22c and eggs were 11c. Fresh herring were offered in large quantities and sold at 8c to 10c per dz. Only one load of turnips was offered. Pork sold at 6 cents.

Messrs. Conrod Bros, formerly of Lunenburg will conduct a fish business in Georgetown. The firm will handle all kinds of fish including codfish, mackerel, herring, etc. Messrs. Conrod considers Georgetown a head of any port on the St. Lawrence for their business. They have 500 bbls of herring ready for shipment.

Yesterday evening a special despatch received in the city stated that fire with its destroying effects had again visited the western section of the province. In the afternoon the house of Wm. McNeill of Tignish was burned to the ground. Nothing was saved but the furniture in one bedroom. The cause of the fire is unknown as the house was partly destroyed when discovered. In the house was \$250 in cash.

Operetta and Concert

A well filled theatre greeted Mr. S. N. Earle and his staff of soloists and artists, last evening. The musical part of the entertainment was heard with great effect. All of the soloists were in excellent voice and the nature of the selections would keep the most stolid audience in a glow of laughter.

The different performers are too well known to need individual comment but the solo of Mr. Charles Earle may be mentioned without at all detracting anything from the others. As the air is full of patriotism at the present time it might be expected that "another little patch of red" would simply bring down the house which it did. The recitation of Miss Helen Warburton, The cavalry sword drill, the selections by the St. Cecilia Club and the Orchestra, in short each and all were fully up to the expectations of the audience and the performers one and all fully sustained their reputations. In the rendering of Pauline it is unnecessary to particularize as each of the different characters did his or her part so well. Mr. Charles Earle strongly impersonated Captain Western, the typical cruel father as regards his daughter's love-affairs. Miss Florence and Amy Earle as Pauline Western and Clara Rivers respectively acted their parts exceedingly well. The repeated hursts of applause by the audience showed clearly that though they were there expecting a great deal they were in nowise disappointed and though the entertainment was somewhat lengthy, being nearly two and a half hours in the rendering, no one was weary or wished for the curtain to fall. Mr. Earle at the performers of last night certainly deserve the gratitude of the theatre going public of Charlottetown for so often providing for their recreation. The entertainment was one that is made possible through the joint efforts of a masterly conductor and trained soloists and performers.

The many lovers of music will hope that Mr. Earle will again favor them at a not too distant day.

That the aboteau and dyke on Bradshaw's Creek are there to stay is now a pretty well assured fact, and it looks as if the most sanguine hopes of the promoters are to be realized. It will be remembered that Mr. Abraham Schurman, that veteran marsh-owner and the most active promoter of the work, some time ago seeded down some 50 acres of his marsh, being confident that upland hay can be successfully and profitably raised on marshes. Whilst walking over Mr. Schurman's marsh a few days ago the writer noticed in many places bunches of clover and timothy, and it would thus appear that the experiment has proved a success. Mr. Schurman also intends breaking up portions of marsh and to try how the various grains will flourish in a marshy soil. His experiments will be eagerly watched by the many marsh owners.

At last there has been completed in Bedouque a work that reflects great credit upon its originators and that shows what good results may be attained by persistent energy and ingenuity. About a year ago the Messrs Hooper determined to utilize some of the breezes that occasionally pass over Bedouque and resolved to erect a windmill, not one of those imported ones but one of their own manufacture. At one time their hopes seemed to be realized, but it was found that there was too much speed and not enough power. With admirable perseverance however, they started anew and have at last completed a windmill which for power and smoothness of running cannot be surpassed by any of the imported ones. The windmill is one of the largest, if not the largest in this province being 16 feet in diameter and with a gentle breeze will run the different circulars, band saws, boring machines, planer etc., which fill up Mr. Edward Hooper's apartment. Drilling and other machines are also run in Mr. Allison Hooper's shop. Mr. Allison Hooper has also completed a small windmill for pumping purposes which he intends placing over his barn.
