

—WEDDING.—A very pretty but quiet event took place on Tuesday evening at the Presbyterian Manse Kensington, when Miss Ida Bernard of Summerside was united in marriage to Mr. Frank Green of Summerside by the Rev. W. Goodwin after a brief honeymoon they will reside in Summerside. Their hosts of friends wish them a happy and prosperous journey through life.

**ARCHBISHOP SINNOTT RETURNS.**—After an absence of more than seven months in Rome, His Grace Archbishop Sinnott is once more in Winnipeg. He has returned refreshed to the scene of his labors and since his home coming this noted son of Prince Edward Island, has been tendered many marks of affection and loyalty denoting the great esteem in which he is held.

**LAI D TO REST.**—The funeral of the late Mr. Joseph Carter took place yesterday morning, a large number of citizens attending. The cortege was preceded by the members of the city Police Force, of which the deceased had formerly been a valued and esteemed member. The pall-bearers were Messrs. James Stewart, J. Edward Bell, P. S. Brown, Thomas Dover, James Kelly and John Cronin. Rev. James McLaughlin officiated at the service held at the Cathedral.

**GUN PRESENTATION.**—Between 11 and 12 o'clock today, the King's birthday, the Summerside stores and places of business will be closed and the citizens will be able to witness the ceremony of the presentation of the German field gun to the town, represented by the Mayor, by Mr. Neil McLeod, K. C., chairman of the Victory Loan committee. The gun will be drawn to Dominion Square with all due eclat, and there due recognition will be taken of an event which will be marked down prominently in the history of Summerside. A program of speeches is being arranged.

The town of Souris again has the mantle of gloom resting upon it caused by the sudden death, due to heart failure, of Mrs. Frank Conroy, (nee Alice Moore) on Friday morning, May 28th. Mrs. Conroy was a daughter of the late Edward Moore of Charlottetown. In addition to her sorrowing husband and daughter, Miss Ethel, she is survived by her step-mother and half brother, Harold.

The late Mrs. Conroy was a valued and consistent member of the Methodist Church, having for many years most efficiently acted in the capacity of organist. She always took a keen interest, not only in all the departments of church work, but the social welfare of the community as well. She was noted for her hospitality, her kindness and those graces of character which mark the noble woman, the devoted wife and mother, the encouraging friend. We shall miss her cheery presence, her counsel and help, but the fragrance of her life will remain with us.

**TIMBER DESTROYED.**—A fire which involved the loss of much valuable timber to the amount of approximately \$5,000 about two miles from Kensington on the Irish town road, started during the early part of last week and finally burnt itself out by Friday. The timber formed a strip about a mile in length and bounded the properties of Messrs James Dunphy, where the fire originated, James Sheen, George Cotton, P. McDonald and Daniel Goodwin. All the fencing in that quarter was destroyed. A second fire of the same nature broke out on Friday about noon about two miles from Kensington on the Malpeque road leading to Indian River. In this case it was merely undergrowth which suffered, although at times it was feared that house properties in the vicinity might be destroyed. Dwellings owned by Mrs. McLellan and Mr. Wm. Tuplin as well as a barn belonging to Mr. Fred Beato were threatened to the extent that the furniture and contents were removed pending the outcome. Fire guards were pined and a big effort eventually successful, was made to prevent the fire spreading. Up to Monday it was still burning but was under control and slowly petering out. Large crowds from Kensington visited the scene of the fire.—Farmer.

Mr. Bonnell's many Island friends will wish him a speedy and complete recovery.

**FIRST NEW OFFICIAL.**—Mr. Benjamin Rogers has the honor of being the first official appointed by the government, so far as appointments have been announced, in connection with the new taxation. He is to be assistant to the Assistant Provincial Secretary, Treasurer, Mr. Newberry, and general superintendent or commissioner, or minister of taxation, the distinctive official title not having yet been agreed upon. The salary attached to the new office, provision for which was not made in the estimates, will probably not be announced until the Public Accounts for 1920 are brought down at the next session of the legislature. Mr. Rogers is to be congratulated on his appointment as he has long been a faithful friend to the party now in power.

She was attended by the groom's sister Miss Nellie Chapman, who wore big silk and georgette, while Mr. Fletcher Jordan supported the groom. From the latter port she took a cargo of fish to Pernambuco and from there went to Barbadoes and loaded her present cargo of molasses. The captain's wife accompanied him on the voyage. The vessel is owned by Adams and Knicker and other Lunenburg parties.
