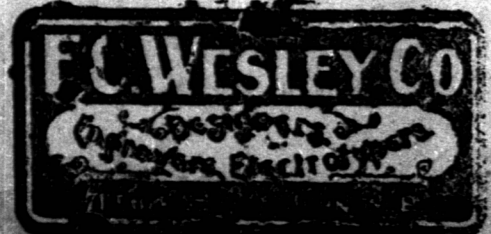

### International Monthly.

The August number of The International Monthly (Burlington, Vt.) contains several foreign contributions of unusual interest and power, and is living admirably up to its mission as a medium of exchange for the best thought of the two worlds.

M. Charles Seignobos of Paris, one of the highest living authorities in history, brings before us, in a graphic review, the many divisions and complications of the "Political Parties in France," Professor Hans Prutz of the University of Konigsberg discusses with an old fashioned thoroughness and gravity the "Economic Development of Western Europe under the Influence of the Crusades" and Professor August Forel of Zurich, the celebrated neurologist and the author of the great monograph, "The Ants of Switzerland," brings all his learning to bear on the problem of "Human Perfectibility." From the very original formation of his brain man is incapable of ever attaining an ideal perfection and a decidedly inferior race will always remain on a low plane of development.—such is Forel's rather cheerless conclusion. But the brain of the superior races is still in the process of growth, he declares, and may reach a much higher form of evolution unless retarded by the unhappy systems of education so generally in vogue,—the incessant cramming of useless knowledge, which exercises the lower at the expense of the higher functions of the brain, and thus retards that process of selection by which alone the more perfect evolution of the higher function is made possible.

In the same number of The International Monthly, Mr. Louis C. Elson, the well-known musical critic, writes on "Music in the Church." Professor Crowell portrays in his study of "American Primacy in Iron and Steel Production," the almost incalculable future of a giant industry. Professor W. P. Trent contributes a sympathetic study of "Branford Matthews as a Dramatic Critic." Mrs. H. O. Taylor reviews Saintsbury's "History of Criticism," and Mr. Russell Sturgis writes on "Recent Work on Greek and Imperial Roman Architecture."

### NAVAL MANOEUVRES ENDED.

LONDON July 30.—For the purposes of the British naval man war was declared yesterday morning, and the struggle of the opposing fleets to try and obtain command of the English Channel and of the approaches to it and St. George's Channel commenced. Before many hours had elapsed a great naval battle was fought off the Scilly Isles. The result of the encounter was the annihilation of the defending squadron, and the English Channel is now apparently at the mercy of the enemy. The fleet, representing the home defenders force, lost the whole of its squadron of cruisers while the enemy's fleet lost eight vessels out of twelve. Eighteen splendid warships had been theoretically destroyed in less than an hour.

LONDON, July 31.—Fire on board the British freight steamer Elswick Park after her arrival at Hamburg July 27, from Pensacola, damaged the cargo in her second hold and the bridge deck. She has 19 feet of water in her engine room.
