JURY FINDS TRUE BILL IN LARGE CASE
January Term of Supreme Court Opens Yesterday—Appeal Case Heard.

A true bill in the case of The King vs. Roy W. Large, charged with murder of his wife Cora Blanch Large, was found by the Grand Jury at the opening of the January term of the Supreme Court.

The trial of Roy W. Large will open Monday morning and that of Douglas Areas Smith will be held on Tuesday.

The Court opened at 11 a. m. with Hon. J. A. Matheson, Chief Justice, presiding and with Justices Arsenault and Saunders on the bench.

After being sworn and charged in connection with the Large case, the Grand Jury returned a true bill, charging the accused with the murder of his wife Cora Blanch Large, on January 8, 1939, at the residence of the accused, 1000 St. John's Street, Moncton.

The King vs. Douglas Areas Smith—Grievous bodily harm (from last sitting) vs. Roy Warburton Large—Murder.

Italo-Hungarian Alliance May Force Nazi Hand
Germany May Be Compelled To Make Unwilling Decision Between Fascist And Soviet Friendship.

BUDAPEST, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Foreign observers said that the defensive alliance reported to have been arranged by Hungary and Italy in a weekend conference at Venice probably would compel Germany to make an unwilling choice between continued friendship with these two powers and her ties with Soviet Russia.

While reports indicated the alliance provided for Italy to come to the aid of Hungary in the event of an invasion by either Germany or Russia, informed sources said it was directed mainly against Russia.

The Hungarian Foreign Minister, Count Istvan Cakky, hurried directly from the station today to Premier Count Paul Teleki and his ministerial report on his negotiations with the Italian Foreign Minister, Count Galeazzo Ciano.

Afterward Teleki and Cakky went to the palace for an audience with Hungary's regent, Admiral Nicholas Horthy. Informed sources said both Horthy and the cabinet welcomed the reported alliance with Rome.

Watch Berlin
Observers closely watched Berlin, where Adolf Hitler was said to be consulting his advisers on how to reconcile Russian friendship and Nazi ties with Hungary and Italy.

Should Hitler decide to sign a definite military alliance with Russia, competent circles in Budapest said he probably could not avoid an open break with Hungary and Italy.

Authoritative sources said the Italian and Hungarian foreign ministers had agreed to offer to help Rumania against possible Russian invasion in return for a settlement of Hungary's demands on Rumania's Transylvania, which was Hungarian before the first great war. Ciano was said to have urged Hungary not to seek a settlement of this issue by force.
