Branches of this organization has been in existence in Canada for twenty years—classes of instruction have been held at many points. We are endeavoring to organize the Association in Canada on a firm, practical, business like basis. We have been able to interest the leading men of Canada in this movement and why? Because the object of this Association must appeal to the sound, common sense of any thinking man or woman. Let us see what these objects are:—

1. The instruction of persons in rendering first aid in cases of accident or sudden illness, and in the transport of the sick and injured. Doesn't that sound a reasonable and practical object? We propose to teach the people just the amount of knowledge necessary to give intelligent temporary first aid assistance between the time of the accident and the arrival of expert medical assistance.

2. Take the second object: The instruction of persons in the elements of first aid and practice of home nursing. While every woman is naturally a nurse, still every woman is not naturally a skilled nurse. The classes held in this subject must appeal to the ladies, and classes can be held in schools and the knowledge spread throughout the country.

The third object must appeal to all of us. It is: The instruction of persons in the principles of domestic hygiene and sanitation.

We all recognize the advance that has been made in this subject in the last few years, and it is part of the work of this Association to extend the knowledge in means and methods of making the people understand that so many of the diseases that mankind suffers from are preventable, and are also preventable by simple

domestic precautions. The fourth object is: The carrying out of works of relief of suffering of the injured in time of peace and also in time of war.

Immediate organized aid in any calamity saves much suffering by the effectiveness with which the work is carried on. When a town is wiped out by fire as was Campbellton recently the demand for aid is urgent and immediate. This Association by its Provincial Branches will be ready and available to act, and at once place its machinery at the disposal of any stricken community within the Province, for the relief of the injured and suffering.

The last object is a patriotic one; it is to organize auxiliary voluntary aid centres in time of war. This part of the work might be forced upon us at any time, but it must be clearly understood that this Association is in no sense a military one, and that it is only indirectly that it would be of use and service in time of great National necessity.

The objects of the St John Ambulance Association have a practical side, a commercial side, a conserving side and a patriotic side.

Amongst whom will this work be carried out? It has been said that there are too many organizations here. But the more organizations the better, for there is hardly an organization of any kind that can not in its own circle take up this work and form and hold classes.

Large business organizations such as the C. P. Ry., are taking this matter up. The C. P. Ry. has a special department for ambulance work and the directorate fully realize the practical and commercial value of having its employees trained as first aiders.

By the regulations of the Marine Department it is compulsory upon candidates presenting themselves for examination for a certificate for master or mate, to hold a certificate from this Association.

The Police departments of all our cities realize that a policeman is a better officer if he has had training in the direction of being able to meet emergencies by a certain amount of skilled attention.

...The King's County Temperance Alliance will meet in special session in Mackinnon's Hall, Montague, on Friday Oct. 7th, at 2.30 p.m. Chief Justice will be in connection with a petition to the legislature for amendments to the prohibition act. A large attendance is desired. D. L. MacKinnon, Sec.

...A new factory at Bridgetown opens today for the manufacture of farina, dextrin, gum, crystal laundry starch, and high grade mill starch. The company operating will apply at the next session of the legislature for incorporation. The capital stock will be \$100,000 and the following are the officers who will apply: Provincial manager—Harvey D. McEwen; Directors—John McLean, M. L. A., Souris, R. M. Cox, M. L. A., Montclair, W. A. Weeks, Jr., J. A. Fartharson, Charlottetown. The mill is modern in every respect its machinery is up-to-date. It is the first one of its kind in Canada. The farmers of the locality have guaranteed to furnish 40,000 to 50,000 bushels of potatoes each year. About twenty men will be employed this year and next year the number may be increased as occasion demands. The whole plant is estimated to cost \$50,000. The success of this company means much for the immediate vicinity and for the province but all have every confidence in the managers who are thoroughly competent and experienced.

I feel sure that after a little thought you will all agree with me in the desirability of organizing in this Province a Provincial Branch of the St John Ambulance Association which will by the establishment of centres and classes throughout the country carry on the propagation of usefulness which has been so characteristic of this Association of St John Ambulance.

DETAILS OF ORGANIZATION. Capt R. J. Birdwhistle, General Secretary said: The St John Ambulance Association is now established on a firm and substantial basis, with a National Council at Ottawa, responsible to the parent body in England. This National Council is composed of many of the most representative men in the Dominion. Sir Thos G. Shaughnessy, K. C. V. O., is the Honorary President, and has shown his appreciation by contributing the sum of One Thousand Dollars to assist in the organization, and has provided for a railway centre in connection with the C. P. Ry. of which he is President, that is being operated as a separate department, on the same principles as the other branches of the road. Over 1000 men are already under instruction along the line of the C. P. Ry in shops and on trains. The President of the General Council is Dr. Montzambert, I. S. Q., Director General of Public Health, while Col. Jones, Director of Medical Services of the Department of Militia, is a valued member of the Executive Committee. The General Council has the supervision of the work in Canada as a whole, but the administrative work of the Province is under the general direction of the Provincial Council. This body which it is desired to organize here, tonight. The Provincial Council will organize Local Centres, procure and distribute stores to railway and local centres located in the Province. It shall be its duty, when established, to organize possible local centres in the counties, Cities, Towns or incorporated villages and these centres shall report to the Provincial Council, which in turn will report to the General Council at Ottawa.

The officers of a Provincial Association shall be a Patron President, Honorary Treasurer, Honorary Secretary, and a Vice President. The Provincial Council composed of such number of members as the Provincial Council may determine. From this Council there shall be selected an Executive Committee. The Lieutenant Governor of the Province shall be the Patron of the Provincial Council. Each Province shall be entitled to appoint annually two members to especially represent it in the General Council of the Canadian Branch. The annual meeting of the Provincial Council, will be held not later than the second Friday in the month of February, and a report shall be sent in to the General Council not later than the first of September in each year.

The Provincial Council shall organize local centres to take charge of the work in the Cities and Towns, and each local centre shall be responsible for the work of organizing classes by self-sustaining, and self-managing, subject to the rules of the Canadian Branch.

The officers of the local Centre shall be Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Honorary Secretary-Treasurer, together with a committee. The annual meeting of the Local Centres must be held not later than the first Friday in August, and reports should be sent to the Provincial Council not later than the first of August.

Railway Centres may be formed in connection with the Railway System of Canada, and officers shall be the lines of the General Council. Each Railway Centre shall elect annually two representatives to act upon the Provincial Council.

A class consists of 30 members or under, of one sex. Each class so held may be held through the Provincial Council, and by that body to the General Council, the sum of \$3.00 per class. This fee amount to 10

cents for each member taking the course and is not excessive. This fee will be forwarded to the Parent body in England, to help defray expenses, and as a slight return for the free literature furnished. If the class is over 30 and not exceeding 60 the charged are doubled, over 60 and not exceeding 90 trebled, and so on. Different sexes count as different classes no matter how few the number. Each of the first ten classes held during the year will be charged this rate, but for all classes held over ten, the fee will be \$2.50, a reduction which is one of the means of providing a slight revenue for the local centre. These fees apply to all classes except that of nursing, for which volume certificates are issued. For each nursing class received volume certificate the charge for incidental expenses will be somewhat higher. Supplies, such as text books, etc., will be required, and these can be had at a very reasonable sum. The membership shall consist of two classes, Ordinary and Life. Any person may become an ordinary member on payment of an annual fee of \$2.00, to be paid to the local or Railway centre. Life Members are: Persons who pay a single subscription of \$25 and upwards, to the Local or Railway centre; To medical practitioners who have given four courses of lectures gratuitously; Honorary members elected by unanimous vote of the General Council; Persons who were at the date of organization of the Canadian Branch, members of any recognized Centre in Canada. The Provincial Council shall derive a revenue from all subscriptions or donations received as well as for membership. Fifty cents of the membership fee shall be paid to the Provincial Council, fifty cents to the General Council, the balance retained by the local centre through which the fee is paid. One fourth of Life membership fee or donations shall be paid to the Provincial Council, and one-fourth to the General Council, the balance to be retained. Where the subscription is received through the Provincial Council, half shall be paid in to the General Council. The work of the class itself consists of five lectures and demonstrations given by a physician on a plan furnished by the Association, and according to the text book. This is followed by an examination, by another physician, and after which the papers are forwarded to Ottawa from where certificates are issued to all who may have passed the tests. There is also a junior first aid course but no certificates are issued for this. Classes are also held in Nursing, Home hygiene, Sanitation, etc., and the candidate who takes this course of study will be a valuable man or woman in any community. Lectures are held at one week intervals, so that a complete course of first aid can be taken in six weeks. The holder of a certificate may take up the work again in the following year and
