Sunday School Lesson

EB. 11.—THE SPIRIT OF PRAYER

Lesson—Luke 18. Printed Text—Luke 18:

Modern Text.—The sacrifices of God are a broken and a contrite heart: God, thou wilt not despise.

Historical Setting.—TIME.—A. D. 30. PLACE.—East of the Jordan.

Daily Readings.—Monday, February 5.—Persistent Prayer (Luke 18: 1-8). Tuesday, February 6.—Humble Prayer (Luke 18: 9-14). Wednesday, February 7.—Faithful Prayer (Luke 18: 15-27). Thursday, February 8.—Reverent Prayer (1 Kings 8: 33-40). Friday, February 9.—Wholehearted Prayer (Ps. 119: 145-152). Saturday, February 10.—Prevailing Prayer (Jas. 5: 13-20). Sunday, February 11.—Trustful Prayer (Ps. 4: 8).

Introduction.—From Ephraim, which place Jesus with his disciples retired after the resurrection of Lazarus from the dead, the party proceeded by easy stages to the valley of the Jordan, crossing the Jordan river, which then crossed the eastern bank, which brought them again into Peraea in the line of caravans proceeding to Jerusalem for the Passover. A question as to the time and nature of the Kingdom of God was raised by the Pharisees and answered by Jesus in a two-fold reply. He answered first from the standpoint of the Pharisees and then from that of the disciples. The kingdom in its old form had been offered to the Jew and rejected by them, hence it could not be seen now but must come in its spiritual form as a kingdom within. To the disciples he explained some of the external manifestations of the kingdom which was to be. The discussion, from which this lesson is taken, is a continuation of the same subject and must be so studied to preserve the unity of thought.

Comments.—Verse 1—Jesus seems to have still been addressing His disciples. The declaration that men ought always to pray, does not mean that we should be continually murmuring prayers, but that we should never abandon the habit of praying.

Verse 2—The judge held a place in the Orient not corresponding to the judge as we know him. He chose to be a law unto himself there was usually none to gain-say.

Verse 3—The widow in the East was particularly helpless. This one seems to have had no one to intercede with the judge in her behalf. Her only weapon was that of persistence.

Verse 4—For a time the pleas of a defenceless woman were nothing to this corrupt official.

Verse 5—The reason for his yielding to her pleas was of no credit to the judge. He was quite willing that she should suffer in justice, but he was not willing to suffer annoyance.

Verse 6—The righteous man may sometimes learn something from the man of the world.

Verse 7—The parable is one of contrasts. The widow has nothing on which to base her hope that her petition would be heard, while we have many promises in approaching One who is just and loving, and whose delays are never needless.

Verse 8—While the desired object may not be obtained at once, let us know that God does not put off setting the wheels in motion that are to bring to us the things
