MANY to whom she was known and by whom she was esteemed and beloved will learn with deep regret of the death of Miss Edith Emily Ritchie, which took place last evening at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Ritchie, Upper Queen Street. She had been in delicate health during some months past, but down to a few days ago recovery had been hoped for. The deceased young lady was a most dutiful and affectionate daughter and sister, a member of Grace Church Sunday School, Epworth League and of the Choir, and was an especial favorite among the young people of the church. A SOMEWHAT amusing episode took place in a North Eastern section of the town last evening. It was a case of a mill manager taking possession of a house occupied by two well known elderly individuals against whom the former had obtained judgment in the courts. One of the latter was beyond striking distance in another part of the town, while the other was quietly working in the garden at the rear of the house. When the time to begin the attack had arrived the order was given and the owner of the property secretly stole past the unsuspecting man in the garden and opened the unresisting back door. Once inside he took possession and with a half dozen helpers the furniture was carefully conveyed to the street in front. They were nearly through transferring the goods when the gardener arrived and began to argue the law. Little notice was taken of him until the brother arrived and then came the tug-of-war, when the owner's body guard was obliged to use force during which the two old gentlemen were precipitated somewhere near the furniture in a confused heap. A large pane of glass in the door was broken in the entanglement but no one was hurt. The air was full of threats, and points of law were being discussed when the writer took flight.

A sad accident happened in Summerside Harbor about 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Mr. Everett Trenholm, son of Mr. Millidge Trenholm and his nephew, Mr. Edgar Trenholm, son of Mr. Herbert Trenholm of Bayfield, N. B. together with John Smith, son of Mr. Philip Smith, Summerside, who was employed with them about a week ago to work at fishing during the summer, were coming to Summerside from Cape Tormentine in a lobster boat for supplies and when about three quarters of a mile off the Summerside Light House to the westward a squall struck the boat and upset it. The occupants were thrown out but quickly got hold of the boat which was then lying on her beam ends and nearly all under the water.

After some time Smith let go and started to swim shoreward.

The younger Trenholm became chilled and benumbed with the cold and said to his uncle "we are going to be drowned." The elder Trenholm, tried to encourage him to hold on, while there was hope, but the ice cold water was too much for the younger man and after probably an hour's deadly grasp to one of the masts he said "I am gone" fell backwards and was seen no more.

Everett Trenholm still held on to the other mast, while at the same time he had to keep his hands in motion at intervals in order to keep above water. It was a trying struggle with not a rescuer in sight and death staring him in the face but hope conquered, and with all his energy he held on until he saw a sail. He waved his hat and the rescuers were soon approaching him. The sail proved to be a boat containing Mr. Phil. Gallant "the barber" who with a man living in Summerside named Stewart and his son who were working at their traps, saw the drowning men. With all haste they forced their boats toward the victims of the sea, and soon reached Smith who was almost unconscious and with considerable effort they dragged him into the boat. Then they steered for Trenholm and rescued him just in time, for the cold water was fast getting the master of him.

Their next course was for the nearest shore and in few minutes they were landed near Welland's Point, just west of the town. Trenholm was able to walk, but Smith who had become delirious had to be carried along and was immediately taken to a physician, where after an hour or so he recovered sufficiently to be able to walk home. The unfortunate young man Edgar Trenholm, who lost his life was 23 years of age. His body has not yet been recovered. This is the third time that Mr. Phil. Gallant has rescued drowning men.

The Crown Jewels of Great Britain.

In the late issue of the Jewelers' Circular Weekly were illustrated and described the jewelry of the new Queen of England, Alexandra. That article was supplemented with a description of the Crown Jewels of Great Britain stored in the Tower of London. These jewels have been often enumerated and described, and we will content ourselves here with the reference only to the Imperial State Crown worn by Victoria, and made in the year 1838, with jewels taken from old crowns and others furnished by her command. It consists of diamonds, pearls, rubies, sapphires and emeralds, set in silver and gold. It has a crimson velvet cap, with ermine border, and is lined with white silk. Their are 241 pearls in the band alone. In the front of the crown, and in the centre of a diamond Maltese cross, is the famous ruby, said to have been given to Edward, Prince of Wales, son of the Black Prince; by Don Pedro, King of Castile. The ruby was worn in the helmet of Henry V. (Shakespeare's great hero) at the battle of Agincourt, in 1413. The cross is formed of seventy-five brilliants. All told, there are in the crown five rubies, eleven emeralds, seventeen sapphires, 377 pearls and 2,780 diamonds.

YACHTING NOTES.

Perhaps no other sport possesses the same healthful recreation as yachting. Notwithstanding this fact the pleasure boats to be found in Charlottetown harbor are of the most limited nature. This summer however, things point to something better and the addition of a number of new boats will tone up the racing spirit and create quite an interest in boating. Yesterday a representative visited a number of the docks with a view of ascertaining just what the conditions were. He found that Mr. Frank McDonald had secured a yacht built at Morell 18 feet keel, 28 feet deck 7 1/2 feet beam. This yacht is said to be a very smart boat and in her trial trips cut along the river at a lively rate. Mr. Elisha Hines was the designer and many of his boats have developed remarkable speed.

Mr. Henry McKinley is busy constructing a yacht 18 feet keel, 7 feet 4 inches beam, 25 feet over all. The boat is being constructed for Mr. McKinley's own use and is being finished with nice clean material. The yacht will have a steel centre board. Unfortunately the shallows of the harbor will not allow of a deep keel and centre boards are substituted. Mr. McKinley will have his boat ready about the middle of May.

Mr. Martin Pineau is also constructing one some 30 feet in length on the most modern plans. It is understood that it will be different from anything in the harbor.

Mr. Jas. Griffin is contemplating the construction of a yacht and if he goes ahead with it, yacht owners will have to consider Mr. Griffin in the race.

Besides the above a good number of large fishing boats have been constructed owned by Messrs. Taylor, Houston, Ball, and Judson. While the fleet has been augmented by the additions before enumerated yet there remain the yachts of days gone by. Among them are the following: yacht owned by Capt. Laurie, Alma owned by a club; Pereda owned by Mr. Peake; Arrow owned by John Traiour, Ideal owned by John Money; Wanderer owned by S. Moore; Abegweit and City of Baltimore owned by John Moore; Veda owned by John Mills; Flirt owned by Paul Gillis;—owned by A. Eagan; Comet owned by League of the Cross; Mary owned by Capt. McMillan; the Bobs and other smaller boats. A number of the above are being refitted, repainted and changed with a view of bringing them up-to-date. Of course a few of them are very nice boats and a little care in fitting up will make a great change.
