Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any state over eighteen years old may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 creas extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

INTER-MARRIAGES MIX THINGS UP

Among the many effects produced by warfare, none are of more marked import than the sweeping clean of the social structure. At last England sees its weak spots, its finer structures, and its crying needs for reform—only when war sweeps clean away all that has obstructed the clearest views of this nation.

So much needs readjustment and reform that some problems must be placed temporarily on one side while more urgent needs receive first attention.

Among those problems, the solution of which must be postponed, is that of the hardships of British wives unhappily married to German husbands. At present it remains entirely outside the immediate province of the Divorce Law Reform Union, so that whatever I say here regarding that subject is to be read as voicing my individual views, and not associated with the league of which I am secretary.

Conan Doyle's Plea

Not long ago Sir Arthur Conan Doyle wrote a letter to the Times emphasizing the pathetic situation of British women, deprived of their nationality through marriages contracted with Germans. Since that letter I have received numerous letters from English women, who almost implore release or alleviation from unhappy marriages with members of the enemy country.

Many cases prove that the German husband deserted his wife before hostilities commenced. Usually the wife seeks release for reasons which she states quite definitely. Letters point out that British wives frequently have never lived in Germany at any time; know nothing of the German language; and that their children share their ignorance of the Fatherland and its native tongue.

Letters often go on to point out that before the outbreak of war the writers were deserted, and left to provide for one or more children. Here is a typical letter from an English woman married to a German, and it tells its own tale without an explanatory note from me:

Worse Than a Prisoner

"My own case, with but small variation, voices, no doubt, that of hundreds—perhaps thousands. Left to the battle of life long before the hostile operations commenced, with no means except that which I earned for myself and small child; left, too to face alone the greater, more bitter, and unequal struggle during these past three years of warfare. Looked on with suspicion; not needed in posts which I could ably fill; persecuted from job to job—as soon as my German tie is discovered; deprived of the privilege of nursing our wounded; moving about on "Permit"; worse than a prisoner in my own native country—that land which I long to serve, as so many generations of my old military family have loyally done. My sense of justice resents the position.

Fatherland or Motherland?

"Surely no law made by man should have the power to rob one of a British right—that natural claim since the world began—to the land which gave existence. Once British, always British. Once German, always German, etc. Why do we strive with gun and sword? Is it not because no law made by man can unite the Motherland—our Britain—to the Fatherland of the Hun? Then, why are the unfortunate children of these two so irrevocably bound by their marriage contract? In June last I wrote on the subject of divorce or separation to the Home Secretary. In the reply (Letter No. 301,856) it was suggested that I should seek legal advice. How many in these days could afford that course? On behalf, therefore, of my fellow-creatures in bondage I plead for justice and deliverance, or, at least, for the choice of freedom from a union which at the best could be but a bitter error, a bondage indeed, though no doubt (as in my own case) realized too late to avoid. But why too late to mend? Because after the war—what?

"Women placed as I am will still be chained to Germans somewhere, dragging out our lonely lives, who might be happy wives and mothers, in true comradeship, if mated to partners of our own nationality. And if nothing is done to help us to be free, what is the alternative?"

"Return to Germany. I shudder. The weak (Heaven help them), worn out with the unjust, bitter struggle, broken in nerve and health under a burden too heavy to bear, will succumb to their dreaded captivity—worse than death.

"But the true British woman, strong in her love of her country, will fight on, battling with the waves which threaten to engulf her, determined to be free, or still striving to die in that land which gave her birth. O, surely surely, the future of our British power demands without delay the consideration of this subject in the highest places!"

When war broke out harshness of enemy nationality began to fall heavily upon these deserted women. No English firm would offer employment; every one shunned the woman who bore the names of the enemy country; travelling about without permits became illegal; even the English privilege to tend our wounded was denied. Such conditions cause these women to ask:
