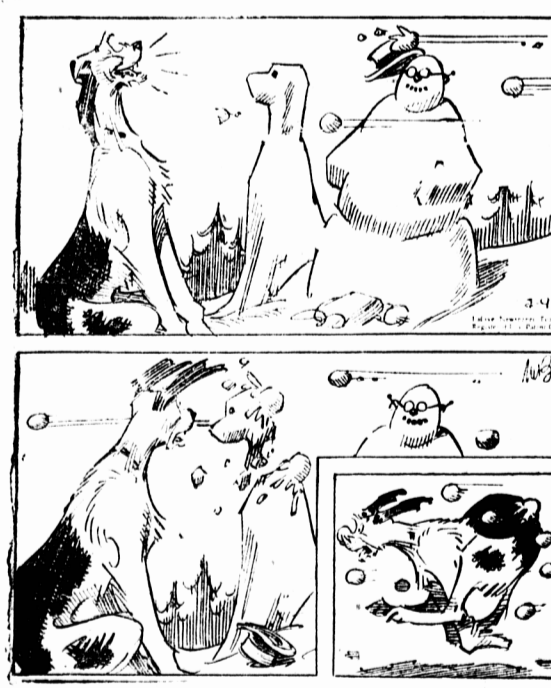

Contract Bridge

THE ETERNAL PROBLEM

Declarer's problem in today's deal was in choosing between two lines of play.

North dealer
Both sides vulnerable.

The bidding:
North East South West
Pass Pass 1♥ Pass
2♣ Pass 3♣ Pass
3 Pass 4♥ Pass
Pass Pass

South started out with his four-card heart suit so as to have a "comfortable" two-diamond rebid. If North responded with one spade, one notrump or two clubs, South's three notrump bid was somewhat ambitious, but not illogical.

West had stayed out of the bidding on his first round because of his defensive values against hearts. Now, faced with a three-notrump contract, he made the conventional lead of the club queen.

South won the first trick with the club king and ran off the diamond suit. Immediately, West was in some difficulty for discards. He let go two hearts, and then, when his partner signalled with a high spade, discarded the deuce and six of that suit.

With five diamond tricks and one club home, and with the spade ace for the seventh trick, South (who won the last diamond in dummy) could now of course try the heart finesse for his eighth and ninth tricks. After some reflection, however, declarer decided against that play. East, after following to two diamonds and discarding one spade, then discarded two clubs, and South was sure that East would not have given up all of his clubs, thus cutting his communication to partner. So, convinced that West had started with only five clubs, South now carefully cashed the spade ace, to take out West's exit, then at a club. After West collected his four club tricks, he had to return a heart up to South's major tenace.

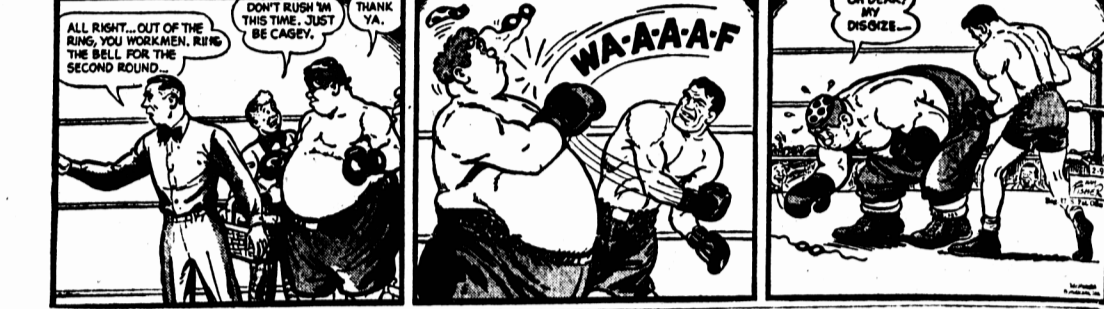

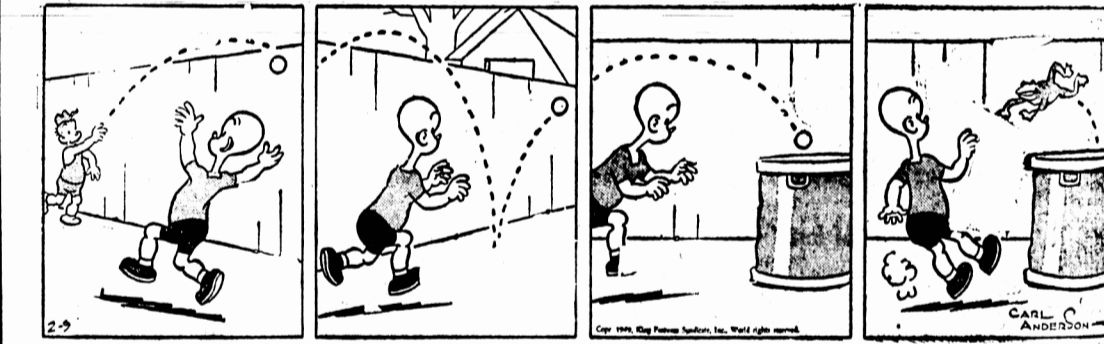

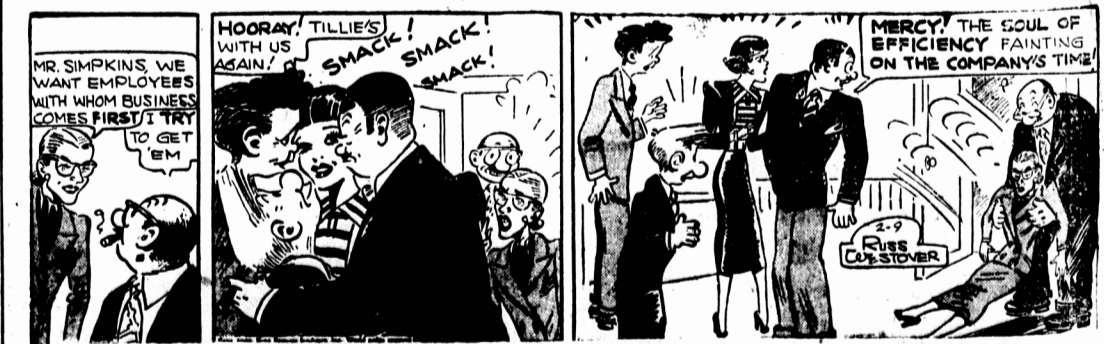
