\$150,000,000 For Dodge Bros, Inc.

NEW YORK, April 2.—After a spirited struggle between powerful financial interests, ownership of Dodge Brothers, Inc., one of the country's largest automobile companies, today passed to Dillon, Read and Co., New York bankers, in a cash transaction involving slightly less than \$175,000,000. The exact purchase price was not revealed by the bankers, but it exceeded a combined cash and securities offer of more than \$150,000,000 submitted by the General Motors Corporation, through J. P. Morgan & Co.

(3) No contractor work was done by the day.

(4) No contractor work was done by the day. Stone and lumber was supplied by various parties, see appendix 7 page 97, Public Accounts. The rate paid for round lumber from 10' to 22' long, was from 60 cents to \$1.50 each. The rate paid for curbing and railing \$2.50 per hundred to \$2.75 per hundred. Stone 15 cts. per load. The work is not yet completed, expect to finish it during the present season.

(5) No contractor work done by the day. Part of project No. 38. See Appendix 8, page 110. Public Accounts. The rate paid for stone was 90 cts. per yard, lumber at \$2.25 and \$2.50 per hundred.

(6) The concrete work on Rattentbury Road Project No. 70 was let to D. A. McDonald, Wheatley River, for the names of the tender see page 31. Public Works Report 1924. The contractor supplied the sand and gravel and the Government supplied the cement.

(7) Joseph I. Stewart was time keeper for a portion of the time and was paid at the rate of \$2.00 per day.

(8) No contractor work done by the day.

HON. MR. McDONALD: Number Six on the question is not answered. I would like to say that in all the years I have been in this House and of all the questions I have heard asked, I never heard one asked in such a manner. I have never heard of a member who tried to cast aspersions on a fellow member in the contemptible manner in which this is done. If the hon. member took the trouble to look up the records that are before this House he would see by the Public Works report that there never was a tender or a contract to Hon. Murdock Kennedy or to Edward Taylor. He knows that Hon. Murdock Kennedy could not tender or be a contractor. I do not know what he means by the question unless it is to cast a mean insinuation upon a member of this House, and also an insinuation that the Department is trafficking in contracts of that kind. All I have to say is that the insinuation contained in the question is as mean and false as it can possibly be.

THE SPEAKER: The hon. member must have known that the Hon. Mr. Kennedy could not possibly tender, and he should have looked up the Public Accounts before he put the question on the order paper.

PREMIER STEWART: If I may be permitted, Mr. Speaker—otherwise I will make the necessary motion to adjourn—I would like to draw the attention of the hon. member who put this question on the order paper, that it is the practice in British parliaments, that any hon. gentleman who puts a question on the order paper in any form, making a statement against another hon. member which is a definite charge against him as a member of the House, has a right to establish that charge or resign his seat. Here the statement is made that the contract had been awarded to Hon. Mr. Kennedy and that he, a member of this Government, put in a tender, which would be a breach of his privilege and an offense which would necessitate his being unseated. It is a definite charge of a most serious nature against the character not only of the hon. member but of the Government.

MR. McARTHUR: Is it my privilege to make a remark?

THE SPEAKER: Certainly.

MR. McARTHUR: After all the explanation of the Minister of Public Works I can see that possibly this question was not given the consideration it should. I am frank enough to admit that as the Minister knows there are a lot of these questions that come in from the constituents, I am not making the charge. I don't know if the contract was given. If the question can be answered that it was not given to Hon. Mr. Kennedy I am perfectly satisfied.

THE SPEAKER: As I told the hon. member, before he put that question on the order paper he should have looked it up. You have made a definite charge against the hon. member for Bradabane.

MR. McARTHUR: I will explain that in this House before questions have been asked, and when you were in Opposition, and when you were

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
