The captain has had a long career at sea—31 years, and during that time, although he has been most of it at sea, he has never been shipwrecked, and never lost a man. The Gloria left Sydney Saturday evening just before dark. She put into Beaver Harbor Sunday for the night, and proceeded for Halifax early Monday morning, arriving here at 1 o'clock Tuesday morning. Capt. Ross sailed for many years out of Halifax for James Fraser, in the Etta A. and the Mary Leslie, also the Sapphire and Edward Blake. This season he was in the employ of the Dickie Lumber Company, and spent much time at Hamilton Inlet.—Halifax Chronicle.

The steamer Stanley arrived in port yesterday afternoon after the summer's work on the Marconi stations.

It is probable owing to the refusal of the Railway authorities to issue passes to the militiamen who go to Ottawa to shoot at the D. A. R. Meeting that the P. E. I. R. A. will not send a team this year. Nova Scotia has already decided not to go. The only Island men likely to shoot at Ottawa are Capt. Jones and Sergeant Moore of Pownal who leave Saturday. The shooting begins Monday.

JAMES PENDERGAST, a native of Kensington, was one of the competitors in the 32nd annual picnic and games of the Calceolite Club at Roxbury, Mass. In the 56 pound weight Pendergast surprised D. Mahoney, winning with a throw of 40 ft. 4 in., Mahoney's best in competition being 20 ft. 9 in. He afterwards in an exhibition throw it 32 ft. 2 1/2 in., which, in competition, would have been a record. In the 16 pound shot put Mahoney ably avenged himself for his defeat in the weight, winning over Pendergast with a put of 40 ft. 2 in., the best effort of Pendergast being 37 ft. 11 in., R. Ewen getting third with 37 ft. 9 1/2 in.

The schooner Maggie Millard, Captain Ormiston, came within a hair's breadth of being sent to bottom by the S. S. Halifax when crossing the Strait of Canso last Friday night, says a Louisburg correspondent. The night was very dark and foggy. Captain Ormiston was on his way to Louisburg, and was steering an easterly direction, while the Halifax was on her way to Halifax and steering a southwest course. What prevented a serious accident was the good fortune that the pennant holding the main boom gave way, tearing the bolt out of the rail, and throwing the boom to the other side of the ship.
