BUILDINGS DESTROYED—The residence and two barns of Mr. Frank McQuaid, Lot 65, were completely destroyed by fire on Friday last. The fire which was discovered about 10 o'clock in the morning when the men were at work in the woods, apparently was caused by a defective flue. Almost all the machinery in the barn was saved. There was some insurance on the property.

WILL PREACH SERMON— Rt. Rev. Joseph A. O'Sullivan, Bishop of Charlottetown, has accepted the invitation to preach the sermon in English at the consecration of Rt. Rev. L. J. A. Melanson, Bishop-elect of Gravelbourg, Saskatchewan. The bishop-elect will be consecrated in St. Michael's Cathedral on February 22. His Excellency, Most Rev. Andrea Cassulo, Apostolic Delegate to Canada and Newfoundland, will preside, and assisting consecrators will be Most Rev. C. McGuigan, Archbishop of Regina, Saskatchewan and formerly of Charlottetown, P. E. I., and the Rt. Rev. P. A. Chaisson, D.D., Bishop of Chatham, N. B.

DEATH OF CORNELIUS HARRINGTON—The death occurred at the home of his adopted son, Henry Summerside, Mr. Cornelius Harrington, at the advanced age of 92 years. The deceased was a native of Egmont Bay and lived there until the death of his wife, (Catherine O'Connell), which occurred nine years ago. He then sold his farm and came to reside in Summerside, where he has made many friends. He was a quiet home-loving man, and was highly esteemed in the community. He was a devout member of St. Paul's Church and was attended by his pastor during his last illness. There are left to mourn, besides his son, Henry, two brothers, John A., of Boston, Mass., and Vincent J. Harrington, of Summerside. The remains will be taken to Egmont Bay for burial.—S.

A groom was cast overboard in Canoe Cove and vicinity on Jan. 2nd when it became known that Donald E. MacDougall of Canoe Cove passed away in the East Boston relief hospital from an auto injury received on Jan. 1st. The deceased was in his 33rd year. The remains arrived home on Jan. 7th and the funeral service was held in Canoe Cove church on Jan. 8th and was largely attended. The service was conducted by the Rev. Ewen MacDougall. There are left to mourn the groom's brother, John A. MacDougall of Canoe Cove, and a nephew, Archibald M. Campbell, in Truro, N. S. besides a large number of relatives and friends. The remains were laid to rest in the family plot at Canoe Cove. The pallbearers were: Walter Carson, Archie Campbell, Dan Mackinnon, Donald MacDougall, Jacob Inman and S'gas Murray.

Mr. J. W. Boulter, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, has returned from Halifax and Fredericton, where he attended meetings of farmers of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. On Tuesday, Jan. 24th, Mr. Boulter was present at a meeting in Fredericton of representatives of the various agricultural societies of New Brunswick.

Following an address by Hon. S. Smith, Minister of Agriculture at New Brunswick, Mr. Boulter addressed the gathering on the subject of "Marketing and Co-operation."

On Wednesday Mr. Boulter journeyed to Halifax and on Thursday was in session with manufacturers of fertilizer, representatives of the Experimental Farms, and Departments of Agriculture of the Maritime Provinces. Mr. G. S. Pilart, Chief of the Fertilizer Division, Ottawa, was present and discussed suggested changes to be made in the Fertilizer Act. A very constructive discussion on the best forms of mixed fertilizers to place on the market took place. It was decided to hold a meeting of a Maritime Council on fertilizer at Sackville in June during the time of the annual meeting of the live stock shipping clubs.

Ten inches of snow driven by gusts of wind which reached a velocity of 48 and 50 miles an hour, times, and which averaged as much as 39 miles an hour, blanketed the province in the week-end. Mild weather yesterday and about one-tenth of an inch of rain melted much of the snow. Considerable damage to wires kept linemen of the telephone and electric companies busy yesterday and Saturday. Rail service was not affected by any appreciable extent. Travel by automobile in the country was impossible, and in the city extremely difficult. On the telephone lines, poles were reported to be broken at

Fredericton, between St. Eleanor's and Miscouche. As the line on the Malpeque Road connecting Charlottetown and Summerside was out of commission, an emergency circuit along the south shore and through Crapaud was established. No reports of trouble came from the eastern part of the province. Summerside and vicinity seemed to suffer most. In the city there was some slight damage reported, but employees of the telephone company were promptly at work to restore service.

DEATH OF MRS. JOHN S. MACNEILL, OF CAVENTISH— There passed away on Friday, January 27th, at her home in Cavendish, Mrs. John S. McNeill, after only one week's illness. Mrs. McNeill was 84 years of age. She was a Miss Annie Maria McLeod and had lived in the vicinity all her life. She will be very kindly remembered for her many estimable qualities and cheerful disposition. Besides her husband, there are left to mourn two daughters, Mrs. Benj. Simpson, of Lynn, Mass., and Mrs. Warren, of Ottawa, who are at present at home; and two sons, Frank, of St. John, N.B., and Ernest, at home, to whom much sympathy is extended. The funeral took place on Sunday from her late residence.—S.

PRISONER SENTENCED— In the Supreme Court yesterday morning Lawrence Clinton recently found guilty of stealing from a person was sentenced by Mr. Justice Saunders to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary.
