A COMMENDABLE MOVE.—As is well known a branch of the St. John Ambulance Association, has been organized at Charlottetown in connection with the Prince Edward Island Railway. A room in the Stores Department has been fitted up with the equipment necessary to give aid in the injured. This room which is in charge of Mr. Herbert VanDerstine contains a bed, hot and cold water for washing wounds, bandages, splints, and other surgical essentials. There are boxes containing charts, illustrating various fractures and other injuries; parts of a skeleton, including a skull, and a number of the principal bones. Every Wednesday afternoon from 1.30 to 3.00, a lecture is given to a class of thirty, by Dr. Dewar, instructor in first aid. Each conductor on the road is being supplied with a box containing bandages, drugs, etc., for treating the injured. "until the doctor arrives."
