## Dominion Live Stock Report

(Canadian Press)  
MONTEAL, Aug. 2.—Cattle receipts 1,250. With a heavier offering of cattle, including several loads of North West origin trading was very slow and the few sales made up to ten o'clock were at fifty cents lower. A couple of straight loads of fair good steers were sold for \$6.50 and \$6.75 and a half dozen of the best steers were picked out at \$7.25, medium quality light steers and heifers were sold for \$6.00 and good fat cows \$5.00. Bulls were quoted at from \$3.00 to \$4.00. There were not sufficient sales made up to ten o'clock to establish complete quotations, western quotations butcher steers, good \$6.60 to \$7.25, medium \$6.00 to \$6.50, common \$5.00 to \$6.00. Butcher heifers, medium \$5.50 to \$6.00, common \$4.00 to \$5.25. Butcher cows good \$5.00, medium \$3.25 to \$4.50, common \$2.00 to \$3.25, cutters \$2.50 to \$2.75, butcher bulls, common \$3.00 to \$4.00, calf receipts 2,464. Veal calves were in good demand and brought from \$8.50 to \$9.25 with choice ones picked out at \$9.50 and \$10.00. Common sucker calves sold around \$8.00, and heavy skim milk calves were \$6.50 to \$7.00. Grassers sold \$4.50 to \$4.75. Quotations good veal, \$10.00, medium \$7.75 to \$8.20, common \$6.50 to \$7.00. Grassers \$4.50 to \$4.75, sheep receipts 3,002. Lambs sold today for \$15.00 and common kinds \$14.00 to \$14.25. Cull lambs were very hard to sell and \$12.00 was offered for a few lots. Sheep sold for \$4.00 to \$6.50. Quotations ewes \$4.00 to \$6.50, lambs, common \$14.75 to \$15.00, common as hard as diamonds for cutting \$14.00 to \$14.25, hog receipts 2,198 glass.

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—Archer Winston of Princeton University is the winner of the first Intercollegiate Literary Contest for prose writing, conducted during the last year under the auspices of Harper's Magazine. His "Story in descending Discords" was given first prize of \$500 by the judges, William M. Fee, Christopher Morley, and Zona Gale. Manuscripts were submitted by undergraduates in eighty-four of the leading colleges and universities in the United States.

The award story, an account of the decline and fall of a freshman at Princeton as told in his letters to his parents, will be published in the August magazine. Winston, a New Yorker, wrote the story while a senior.

Two second prizes of \$300 each went to Mary Lispenard Cooper of Vassar College; and Walter D. Edmonds, Jr. of Harvard.

Winners of honorable mention are Julia Godman, University of Oregon; Gilmore Flues, Princeton; Roberta E. Smith, Washburn College; Marie of Nebraska, University of Nebraska; and Fench F. Tighman, University of Virginia. The contest was conducted with the cooperation of the English departments of the colleges which entered.

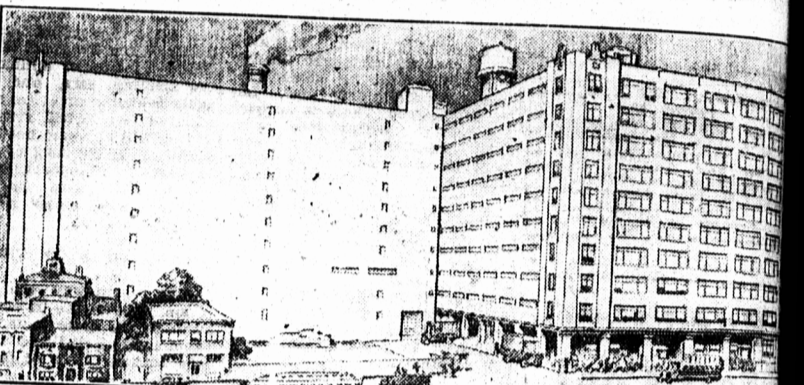
## Lenglen Will Tour States in Fall

## New \$5,000,000 Cold Storage Plant



Negotiations have been completed for the erection and work will be commenced upon a terminal warehouse and cold storage plant to cost in the neighborhood of five million dollars and to be located just below the Place Viger Station on Craig Street, Montreal, according to information given out at Canadian Pacific Railway headquarters. The plant will be built by the Montreal Rail and Harbor Terminals, Limited.

It will have a space area of 600,000 square feet, of which one-third will be devoted to refrigerator purposes, the balance to be used as dry storage for package freight and other merchandise. It will be one of the most modern construction of concrete throughout.

The building, which will be ten stories high, will, it is stated, be completed in ten months. The Montreal plant will be built on property purchased from the Canadian Pacific Railway to serve the tracks and shipping facilities of other concerns of a similar nature in Montreal. It will be in no sense competitive with the existing cold storage plants in Montreal, but will develop and expand its own and other departments, such as butter, cheese, eggs and other delicacies, so far as its cold storage and dry storage space will be empty with package freight and other merchandise.

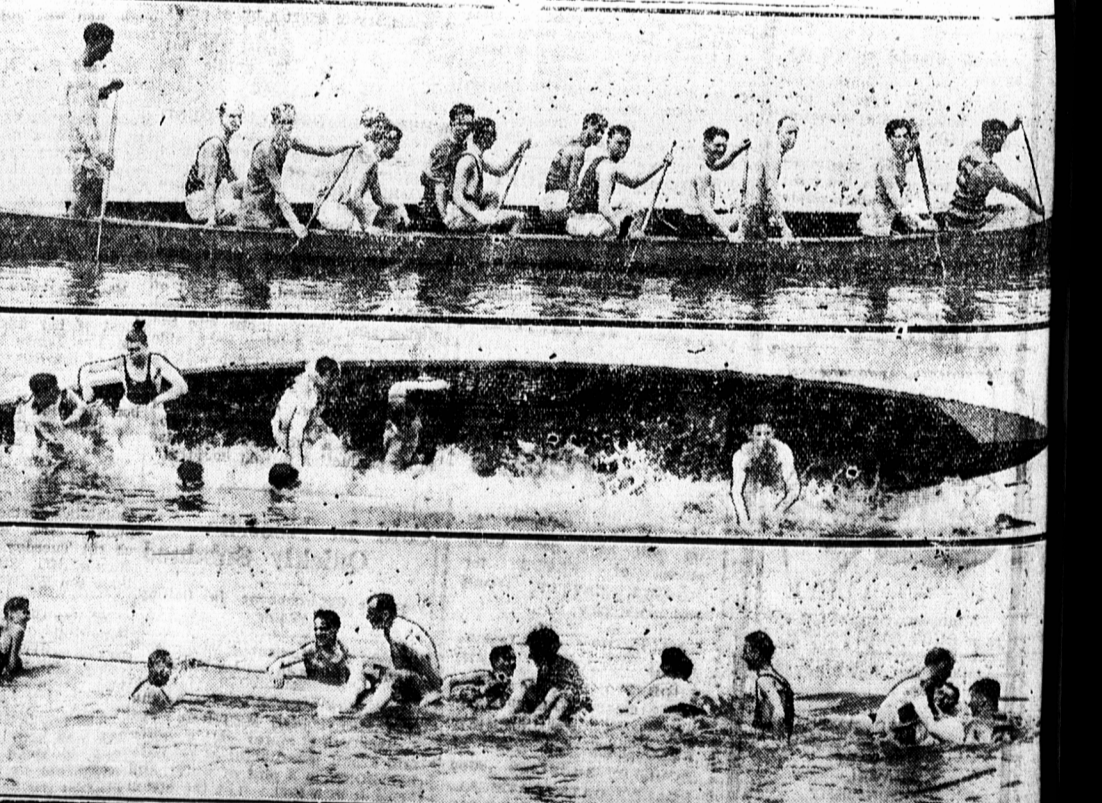
