Breakfast foods 100 marks per 20 lbs. (1120 marks). Canned Lobster 200 marks per 20 lbs. (800 marks). Milk powder 40 marks per 220 lbs. (60 marks). Slightly salted livers 16 marks per 20 lbs. (60 marks). Sardines 30 marks per 220 lbs. (75 marks).

In the fiscal year 1930, Canada's imports from Germany were valued at \$21,500,000, and in 1931 at \$16,000,000. Canadian exports in 1930 were \$25,300,000, and in 1931 practically \$13,000,000. In 1930 Germany ranked fourth in Canada's trade, both as to imports and as to exports.

A vast increase in many exports to Germany is forecasted by the new arrangement. An increased market for wood pulp alone of \$1,000,000 per annum is estimated. Recreation of a large market for Canadian apples, practically obsolete since 1924, is anticipated.

Chief Canadian exports to Germany on which the conventional tariff will be accorded include, fresh apples, wood pulp, pulp wallboard, butter, eggs, fresh breakfast foods, canned lobsters, milk powder, slightly salted livers and sardines.
