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NEW ZEALAND WOOL AT RECORD PRICES

WELLINGTON, N. Z., Aug. 17 (CP)—Sales of wool created records in the season just ended. The total payment and the price per bale were the highest ever known in New Zealand.

Sales realized \$123,820,000, an increase of \$6,400,000 over those of the previous year. The average price per bale was \$144, about \$2.30 above the previous season's level which was the highest previously recorded.

In the 1930-31 season the total proceeds from wool sales in New Zealand were \$13,992,000. At the lowest point of the depression wool was bringing only \$30 a bale.

WHEAT FROM DIAMOND JUBILEE—Canadian wheat, which was shipped to Great Britain more than fifty years ago, has been returned to Canada for germination tests and possible display purposes. It is reported in Foreign Trade and Commerce. It formed part of an exhibit of various products grown throughout the British Empire erected during the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria on the present site of the Admiralty Arch, in Whitehall, London.

The wheat, which was acquired as a souvenir by Mr. E. Nichols of London when the exhibit was dismantled, has acquired added interest, for it was one of the few things salvaged from the ruins of his home which suffered destruction during an air raid in January, 1942.

Commenting on his experiences the time of the Diamond Jubilee, Mr. Nichols recalled that he sat on one of the lions in Trafalgar Square to watch the procession. He saw the wooden stands that were erected along the route for the convenience of spectators who could pay for seats! Being only a boy of thirteen in 1837, he had been unable to rent a seat from which to watch the Queen drive by.

FOUND AT LAST—KRISTIANSAND, Norway—(CP)—A German prisoner who escaped near here in 1945 has finally been found. He had been drowned, it was learned that the man changed to civilian clothes, walked out of the prison camp and lived on the island of Klekkeroy. He spoke perfect Norwegian.

REDLINGTON, Rutland, England—(CP)—While villagers were discussing how to raise £500 (\$2,000) to repair the parish church roof, the church was struck by lightning. Another hole appeared in the roof and the weathervane was torn away.
