## CONSERVATIVE MEETING AT MONTAGUE

a sound foundation and the annual deficit of \$45,000 had been replaced by a surplus of \$70,000 per annum. The Premier dealt in detail with the work of the Public Works Department and rebutted the charges of extravagance made against it. He justified, amid applause, the action of the Government in improving the public works and ameliorating the condition of those who had unfortunately become inmates of the Poorhouse and the Asylum. As regards education, there was no normal trading for the teachers when the present Government came into power. Now, not only had they normal training, but they had a summer school for the teachers as well. The Premier referred to general criticisms against the Government and proved conclusively that they were absolutely without foundation. With regard to the increase in the cost of administering the affairs of the province, they had to remember that they were doing increased work, and increased work necessitated increased supervision and increased supervision meant increase in the cost of administration; but all that meant the advance and progress of the province, and no one would dream of going back to the old days of deficits and mal-administration, when the affairs of the province were allowed to go from bad to worse. Touching the balance sheet case, the Premier showed that while they had not for a moment sacrificed their claims for full representation of six, their efforts had resulted in maintaining a minimum of four representatives for all time to come. Proceeding the Premier said the record of the Government was one of which everyone who supported them at the last election had every reason to be proud. In conclusion, he referred to the Field Service Fund and recited the steps taken to ship the oats. About 60,000 bushels had been shipped in the Morweena. When the steamer was chartered they were told that it would carry the whole of the people's gift, but it turned out that that was a mistake. When it was discovered that the vessel had insufficient accommodation everything was done with a view to getting the balance of the oats shipped to France, and Mr. McDonald had gone to Halifax to endeavour to get shipment from there. If it had been possible to get a vessel all the oats would have been sent over months ago. Everything had been done that possibly could have been done to get the oats transported. In April the War Office took the matter into their own hands, and since then the shipment of oats was entirely subject to their control. There were certain things that they could not publish at the present time with regard to the shipment of oats, but he could assure them there was not a word of foundation for the charges made in the matter by the Patriot in starting up trouble. He considered the action of the Patriot no better than traitorous and could not help but epithet with all the other criticisms of the Government made by the Patriot in recent times. The Premier referred to the disorganized rabble running against them, and asked what did it represent but a collection of defeated and discredited candidates who had more records of defeat and failure behind them than had ever been presented to the people of Prince Edward Island before—a disorganized rabble without a leader and without a policy. Were the people of the province prepared to transfer the administration of affairs from the present Government to such an unrepresentative crowd?

Excellent addresses were also delivered by Mr. Donald Nicholson, M.P., Hon. John McLean and Mr. A. L. Fraser. The proceedings terminated with the singing of the National Anthem.

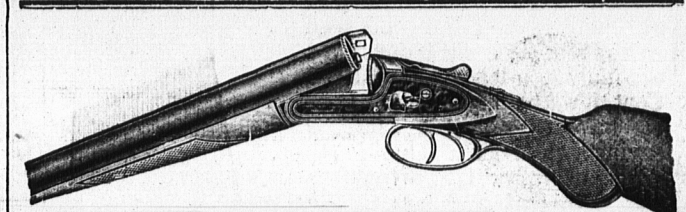
