WITH THE B. C. A. F. SCHEME WHERE IN ENGLAND, Sept. 7 (CP)—Down in Coastal Command the Canadian making a great name for themselves. One of the up-and-coming squaddies is a Hampden outfit commanded by Wing Cmdr. R. A. F. Steel, D.F.C. (Ridley Ave.) Belleville, Ont. His parents live at Hamiota, Man.

On the day that one of his planes fought an air-to-air running battle with six enemy fighters, Rutlan himself brought an enemy submarine to a standstill by dropping depth charges when the server spotted the underwater boat on the surface. One story coming back from Sicily is about a pilot who, on this particular one, is a lady, and much-travelled. She is a little half-brown and white pup, mascot of the Squadron, and commanded by Sqdn. Ldr. George Hill, D.F.C. and bar of Picton, N. S., who tried to fly from a base in Wales. The boys picked her up in Algeria during the squadron's days in North Africa and the ground crew took her with them to Sicily by boat.

TRANS-CANADA AIRLINES

MONCTON, N. B., Sept. 8—With schedule changes going into effect on Wednesday, September 15, improved service to and from Newfoundland via Sydney will be provided by Trans-Canada Air Lines. S. S. Sims, district traffic manager, announced today. A new morning flight will depart from St. John's daily at 6 o'clock, reaching Sydney at 8:55 and Moncton at 10:35 a.m. The evening flight will leave Moncton at 11:40, arriving in Sydney at 1 p.m. and St. John's at 5 p.m. The night flight leaving Moncton at midnight, will be a Sydney at 1:30 a.m. and St. John's at 5:20 a.m.

The addition of a third daily flight between Montreal, Toronto and Winnipeg will relieve the transcontinental flights and give them more accommodation. Passengers, mails and express leaving Moncton at 7:10 p.m. will, by means of this new service, be in Winnipeg the following morning at 6:50.

A third daily flight is being provided between New York and Toronto, Mr. Sims said.

PRACTICAL HELP TO LOCAL FARMERS

"Will there be a field day on the Illustration Station this year?" asked a farmer in the Eastern Townships of Quebec of the Supervisor of Illustration Stations at the Dominion Experimental Farm, Lennoxville, Quebec. When told there would be, the farmer said "Last year from information given me at the Illustration Station I visited I put in the price which saved me \$14 and my son \$28. The previous year, in following another recommendation, I have been successful in increasing my field of turnips to 38 tons. You know we would like to have more such days when farmers could find a means to make from \$15 to \$20 clear."

There were 222 projects, or phases of farm work, under study on the 161 Illustration Stations and District Experimental Stations throughout the Dominion in 1942, and during the year 148 field days were held when nearby farmers visited the Stations, with a total attendance of about 19,395 persons, or an average of 131 per meeting. Neighbouring farmers can visit the Stations at any time to observe how the projects suitable to their own districts are progressing. The work is developed and directed from the Division of Illustration Stations at the Central Farm, Ottawa, and from the various Dominion Experimental Farms.

The Province of Quebec in 1942 led with 48 Illustration Stations, the highest number in any province that year.

In answer to a local farmer to the question "What is a Dominion Illustration Station?", the Supervisor at Lennoxville pointed out that an Illustration Station was neither more nor less than a farm belonging to an individual farmer, who, under the direction of an agronomer representing the Division of Illustration Stations, works for the other farmers of his district by trying to discover for them some means of increasing their harvest, improving their live stock, and finally of organizing their farming business on a more efficient and paying basis. The "Illustration Station" farmer and the other farmers receive the benefit, but for the work to be effective, it must be known. Hence the idea of field days when farmers foregather for special demonstrations, but better still frequent visits to the Station whenever convenient to the farmer visitor.
