GEESE

Cut out all applique and stitch as indicated on small block. Geese are blue with black eyes and orange bill and feet. Insert 3 inch binding to match applique between all blocks and around quilt, as shown on diagram.

Allow for seams when cutting patterns.

Block finishes 9 inches square.

6 applique blocks

6 plain blocks

3 inch binding for insertion and around quilt.

Material Required:

1/2 yard material for plain blocks.

1/2 yard material for applique blocks.

1/2 yard blue material

1-6 yard orange material

11 1-6 yards 3 inch binding for insertion and around quilt.
