THE FARMER AND HIS BOYS.

We touch upon a delicate subject when we deal with the relations between the farmer and his sons. But it is a subject of widespread and general interest where nearly three fourths of our Island population are closely connected with the cultivation of the soil, and where farmer's sons supply so large a proportion of the exodus from our shores to other lands. Why do they go away and what measures can be adopted to retain these young men at home? To the first of these questions it may be replied that we come of the most migratory races. Saxon, Celt, Norman and Dane migrated to the British Isles, and their descendants have migrated thence to the ends of the earth, greatly to the world's benefit, no doubt. So our young men and women too, have the migratory instinct in the blood. "And then, be it observed, youth is the restless period in the lives of most men, especially that period of young manhood when the date of majority is approaching, when he must select a life calling, and the thoughts of a life partner are also stirring in his brain and heart."

The father of the land have themselves passed through these stages in their time, but under different conditions. They worked at home for duty, board and clothing and a very little spending money, and often thought the father was somewhat unkind of the future of his sons—how they were to get a chance to marry and settle and manage for themselves. But now that they have also become fathers they look upon life not as they did when they were grown up sons at home, but just as their fathers looked upon it. The fact is that the outlook upon life varies immensely between the years of twenty and sixty, and the view point determines almost wholly the conclusion that is reached. What seems desirable is that the father of to-day should try and put himself in the boy's place for the time, and the son try to put himself in the father's place for the time, and then take deliberate counsel together for the mutual good of all concerned. By a free talk over the situation in this way a better understanding might be arrived at than is usually had, and here and there at least, an intending exodion may be kept near the old homestead, or at least within the Island, permanently.

We are glad to know that love and reverence for parents are by no means obsolete virtues on Prince Edward Island. Long may they remain with us. But such feelings will be best preserved, in fact can only be preserved, where the principles of justice and mutual respect are basic in the relations between father and son. Too many well-meaning parents make the mistake of treating their sons as mere boys long after they have attained to man's estate. Some continue this mistake until the sons have attained not only greater vigor of body, but greater capacity for management than the father possesses. This is especially true in those cases where the mother has been the more capable of the two members of the parental team—a by no means infrequent occurrence. Be it observed that when a son has attained the age of twenty-one he has alike by the law of the land and by the divine right of manhood, a right to set up business, to think, work and act for himself. His father's counsel may, and must be still valuable to him, but the right to command and control him has ceased on the part of the parent.

Some fathers have been over-zealous in the matter of making farmers of their sons, and in that way have frequently defeated the object most dear to their hearts. It would be well to counsel a son in the matter of selecting a life-calling, but if they cannot agree, it is the son's right to choose for himself. He may choose wrongly, and many do so, but the experiment of making a son a farmer against his will has rarely succeeded very well. Nor should it be thought a strange or improper thing that a young man would desire to see something of the

world before he settles down in the world. The desire to do this is much stronger today than it was in a past generation, chiefly because of the spread of intelligence and the greater facilities for and cheapness of travel. Do not therefore assume that the son is "a prodigal son" after the manner of him in the Scripture parable, simply because the restless migratory instinct is strong in him. With good character and principles he may be as safe in a far country as he would be at home. Without such character and principles he will be unsafe anywhere.

As we have said, the father ought sometimes to try and see things from the son's point of view, and the son to see things from his father's point of view. Notably in this case in regard to property and money. We will say the father of a considerable family has several sons. Let us say there are four sons, aged respectively sixteen, eighteen, twenty and twenty-two. They are doing men's work; perhaps the older ones are doing more and better work than the hired servant man who receives board and eighty to one hundred dollars wages for the six busier months of the year. The sons receive their board and clothes with perhaps a very little spending money. Is it not natural that they should sometimes think, with the younger son in the parable, "I will say to my father make me as one of the hired servants"—in the matter of wages? Or with the elder son. When did you give me the means of making merry with my friends? The wise parent will consider these things somewhat from the son's standpoint, and he and the boys will probably come the nearer together in sympathy if not in agreement as the result of such consideration.

And the son on his part will not forget to consider that his parents watched over and cared for him in his infancy, fed, clothed and educated him and taught him how to earn his living,—acting from a sense of parental duty, no doubt, and so also repaying a similar service rendered them by their parents. The homestead, too, cannot always be divided, and ought not to be encumbered, and the parents ought to retain in their own control enough to ensure their comfort in their declining years. Therefore the parents cannot, beyond a good education, give the sons very much, in most cases. But by the time the elder members of the family are grown up there ought to be an understanding upon a business basis as between man and man, what each son shall receive at a given age, to be possibly increased when a final distribution is made. One half the family feuds and disagreements between fathers and sons and brothers come from the want of a clear understanding based upon business principles between father and sons on the latter attaining their majority.

There are yet many other matters we might discuss in close relation to the subject, but this article is already too long.
