

DUBLIN NEARING STARVATION LIMITS

LONDON, November 26.—A careful estimate given by a man in close touch with Dublin, shows that despite the weekly shipment of provisions sent by the British Trade Congress, and aid from small charities, there are thirty thousand women and children, most of whom get nothing beyond a loaf and a packet of tea daily. There also a thousand waifs from six to twelve years old who do not participate in the food distribution.

The strike pay averages two thousand pounds weekly among 25,000 men, but the enhanced prices of necessities make this a mere pittance. I think the charity organizations would welcome supplies from the Canada Trade Congress. The officials here would not express an opinion on the ideal, but they are not opposed to it.

If a settlement is arrived at it will be months before the distress will begin to disappear. Coal and clothing are also badly wanted.

UNDERWRITING STOCK OF CANADIAN LINES

MONTREAL, Nov. 26.—It is understood that approximately \$1,500,000 of the \$5,000,000 debenture stock of the Canada Steamship Lines, Limited, has been underwritten here and in Toronto within the last few days.

The underwriting has been taken by the interests identified with the consolidation of the R. & O. and allied lines, as part of the arrangement made with the English houses who are to handle the issue, the latter desiring that a certain proportion of the responsibility of the issue should rest with the Canadian interests who are sharing in the promotion.

The consolidation of the different companies is to be rounded off some time next month by the taking over of the Richelieu & Ontario Company, but the final details of the transaction have not been completed. Local

interests identified with the consolidation state that notwithstanding persistent reports that some change would be made in the original plan outlined in the spring, the deal is to go through on the basis then announced.

With regard to the date at which the debenture stock is to be offered for public subscription in London, local interest in the promotion stated today that nothing definite has been settled, but the offering would possibly be made about the middle of December. That rested entirely with the London underwriters. Arrangement respecting the preferred stock of the new company would await the completion of the financing now being done by the sale of the debenture stock.

ECONOMIST PREDICTS WAR WITHIN YEAR

KINGSTON, Ont., Nov. 26.—That war within a year is inevitable along the Rio Grande, the Boyne and the Liffey, was the positive statement of Prof. Skelton, Professor of Political Economy in Queen's University, and one of the best known authorities on political economy in Canada, in the course of a lecture given here last night. Prof. Skelton's subject was "Can War be Ended?" and he further continued, "Is Peace a Utopian Dream or a Possible Fact?"

"There never was a time in history when nations spent so much for armaments as now and only war can right the radically wrong.

"Canada must at the present moment make every preparation for defence. We cannot honorably decline to do so, but Canada should exert

herself to prevent seizure of private property at sea."

Prof. Skelton's statements are attracting considerable attention.

This tabulation is exclusive of the manager, stage managers, inventors, executives of all sorts, ticket sellers, attaches and ushers, cleaners, caretakers, etc., which would go to show that nearly 1500 persons derive their livelihood year in and year out through providing entertainment for the masses that throng the largest theatre in the world. In addition scores and hundreds of scene painters, carpenters, costumers, seamstresses, milliners, wigmakers, boot and shoemakers, etc., are kept busy during certain seasons in the preparations of the annual production.

Standing unique and alone, in a class entirely by itself, the New York Hippodrome is naturally the Mecca for out of town visitors from all parts of the world, for on its vast stage huge productions can be seen which would be entirely impossible elsewhere. Fate seems to have conspired against the canine police department, for ten days ago "Nellie" had to retire to devote her energies to ministering to a flock of baby police dogs instead of chasing speculators and pickpockets. And now—well, half a dozen attaches have been discharged for failing to prevent the faux pas, the house detective was sent out with instructions not to come back without "Chief" and Dr. Martin W. Potter, superintendent of animals at the Hippodrome, is advertising "\$100 reward and no questions asked" for the return of the dog.

The police department is enjoying the discomfiture of the imported competition, while Broadway, always alert to give and jest, is laughing itself into hysterics.


