Nazis Proclaim

was given to the German people for the first time today while the radio resounded with claims of successes for German arms.

"Today begins the last great decisive battle of this year," he had said. "It will hit this enemy destructively and with it the instigator of the entire war, England here!"

"For if we crush this opponent we also remove the last English ally on the continent.

On the assumption widely held in German quarters that the collapse of all European Russian armies was imminent, an authoritative person acknowledged that no one could say whether the Soviet Union would be able to set up new forces during the coming winter.

Conceding that Stalin might withdraw and set up a new front, he asserted this would have value only for propaganda purposes.

Senator John A. MacDonald, proposing the toast to Our Country referred to the terrible struggle in which it is engaged at present. He urged Knights to think about this and reminded them that it is their duty to do their share in supporting the war effort. Each individual should give whatever he could in support of the movement. He pointed out the need of protecting the British Empire and the rights and liberties we enjoy. Continuing he said, "Christianity depends on it democracy depends on it and our freedom depends on it."

Speaking of the part being taken by the Knights of Columbus through their Army Huts, in helping the men on active service, Senator MacDonald said, "It is a source of pride to see what has been accomplished by the organization." He warned against losing a moment in mobilizing all the resources of the country, both in material and manpower to assure the preservation of "our rights and privileges."

Lieut. J. J. MacDonald, No. 62 C. A. B. T. C. Beach Grove, responding to the toast warned against the big task that is ahead in winning the present struggle. He outlined the activities at the training centre where young men are being prepared to serve their coun-

starting from the point where the young explorer, Christopher Columbus was inspired with the desire to gain riches and at the same time pass on the love of God which burned in his soul. This took place about 500 years ago and resulted in the discovery of America.

Pointing out that it was no mistake to celebrate the memory of this great discoverer, the speaker described how Father McGivney formed the great fraternal organization known as the Knights of Columbus. The society had been formed with the idea of establishing an organization in the form of a fraternity. From the first the plan of God had been the brotherhood of man. Since that time, however, the idea of this brotherhood had been lost sight of by men.

"The two perfect societies are the state and the church," Father MacDonald reminded his listeners. The idea of fraternity runs through both and any other organizations can only be supplements. The Knights of Columbus organization is a supplement to the state and church he added.

He stated that there were two common errors. First was the fact that some people believe that clergymen should not talk religion except from the pulpit on Sunday and secondly the assumption by the state of powers that do not belong to it. "If civil authority has any authority, it comes from God," he said.

Speaking of the wonderful record of the Knights of Columbus, he declared that their greatest virtues were those of religion and patriotism.

In his concluding remarks, Father MacDonald urged the Knights not to rest on their laurels but to grow on to bigger and better things.

City Council to Speed action in Tax arrears

A special meeting of the City Council was held in the Council Chamber last evening, with His Worship Mayor Holman presiding, all Councilors expressing their opinions on the subject.

The object of the meeting was to allow the entire Council to review the City's arrears ledger. Mr. J. A. Fullerton, City Clerk, Mr. Gordon Stewart, City Accountant and Mr. Fred A. Large, City Collector were also present and assisted the Councilors in carefully considering each individual account as shown by the ledgers.

The policy to be pursued in the collection of the arrears was discussed at considerable length, all Councilors expressing their opinions as to the most effective action that could be taken in respect to each delinquent. It was pointed out that a number of motor cars were being impounded by the police each day, with a resultant collec-

tion of a considerable amount of personal property taxes. The consensus of opinion was that the time had arrived when much more drastic efforts should be made to enforce immediate payment in all cases, paying special and prior attention to those taxpayers who had made no payments on account of their arrears during the past six months.

His Worship stated he agreed thoroughly with the remarks of the Councilors and suggested that the City Collector be instructed to increase the pressure being applied to the limit prescribed by the law. The matter will receive further consideration at the next regular meeting on Tuesday.

It was also decided that interest would be charged on all arrears as at Dec. 31st, 1940 at a rate of 1-2 of 1% per month, and that no reports would be issued for payments of arrears that did not include this interest computed to the end of the month in which the payment was made.

Temperance Delegation waits On Prov. Gov't

A delegation from the Temperance Federation waited on the Executive of the Provincial Government yesterday and discussed at length the stricter enforcement of the Prohibition Law and submitting suggestions for the tightening up of the issuing of scrips.

The delegation was courteously received and promised that every consideration would be given their suggestions.

The following comprised the delegation: Rev. A. A. MacLeod, O'Leary, Chairman; J. H. McFarlane, Bedouque, President of the Federation; Wm. Drake, Hunter River, Treasurer of Federation; George E. Brown, Margate, Hon. President of Federation; Rev. I. J. Levy and Rev. Hugh Miller, City.

Following were the matters brought to the attention of the Executive: 1. Tourist Scrips—That these not be issued another year, but rather that tourists be warned that liquor is sold legally in Prince Edward Island for beverage purposes. Advertise our province as a "Prohibition Province" to attract tourists.

2. Local Scrips—That a more strict check be made of these by vendors and that doctors be again warned that scrips issued for beverage purposes will not be honored by vendors. That Christmas trade be carefully watched.

3. Enforcement—We are encouraged by the efforts being put forth by the R. C. M. P. in matters of enforcement, but would like a more close check of the source of supply of essences and extracts and such concoctions which are now being sold for beverage purposes in many country stores. Also would call attention to the fact that 1-2 per cent beer and ale is being sold to very young customers in some stores. Could this be stopped?

4. Military Canteens—What is the law in regard to military canteens? 5. Has the Provincial Government any power to induce the police of Summerside and Charlottetown to be more active in prosecuting bootleggers in those places? 6. Temperance Education—We again request that a temperance official be appointed who will teach Temperance in the public schools along the lines of the book supposed to be already in use there, and the
