**Tokyo to New York Flight Expected Soon**  
TOKYO, July 26 (CP)—Japan's most ambitious aerial attempt, a non-stop flight from Tokyo to New York in an all-Japanese designed and built "wonder plane" is expected to be launched in the near future.

The plane, just completed at the Aeronautic Institute of Imperial University, is declared to be capable of travelling 10,000 or more miles without refueling.

Current distant record for airplanes is held by three Russian airmen who flew 6,262 miles from Moscow to southern California. The distance from Tokyo to New York by northern latitudes is approximately 7,000 miles.

**Second Survey Flight Starts On Wednesday**

NEW YORK, July 26 (CP)—A second trans-Atlantic survey flight by Imperial Airways will start Wednesday from Southampton, England, when Captain Griffiths James Power and a crew of three take off in the flying boat Cambria for the first stage of a trip to New York, company representatives announced Saturday.

The Cambria is a sister ship of the Caledonia in which Captain A. G. Wilcockson and his crew recently completed a London-New York round trip simultaneously with a similar flight in the opposite direction by Captain Harold E. Gray and a crew of six in a Pan American Airways Clipper.

The Cambria will fly Wednesday to the Irish transatlantic base near Foynes, and take off Thursday afternoon for an overnight 1,955-mile flight to Botwood, Newfoundland. He will come to New York by way of Montreal and is due here August 1.

New York representatives of the German Luft Hansa said Saturday Atlantic survey flights by way of the Azores to New York would start from Hamburg August 14.

**Old London Library Closes Its Doors**

LONDON, July 26 (CP)—Mudie's is no more. Which, to a London booklover, is as inconceivable as it is lamentable.

Since 1842 Mudie's Library has been catering to the varied demands of tens of thousands of customers. A thesis on predisposition of the ancient Greeks, a penthouse romance of 1937 or the daily paper—Mudie's had it or would get it.

But in their 95th year they have gone under. The mushroom growth of tuppenny circulating libraries, and the decline in the demand for higher-priced books has brought the weighty shelves of 750,000 volumes down upon the not-so-robust cash desk in Mudie's, and the business is closed.

Obituaries in the London papers made no apologies for waxing sentimental over this unhappy ending of a business house of the old-fashioned reputation.

The days of stage coach and consequent problems of delivery, the days of the flickering candle and large type to meet the handicap—these are the obstacles that Mudie's survived only to come a cropper against the more exacting but less picturesque hurdle of modern commerce.

A circular sent to subscribers stated it had been necessary to discontinue the company's business owing to lack of funds. Efforts had been made towards re-organization without avail, and indeed the company warned it might not be able to return unexpired portions of subscription money.
